On September 18 the membership dinner and program will be held, the place to be announced later. Nell Bukowski will be chairman.

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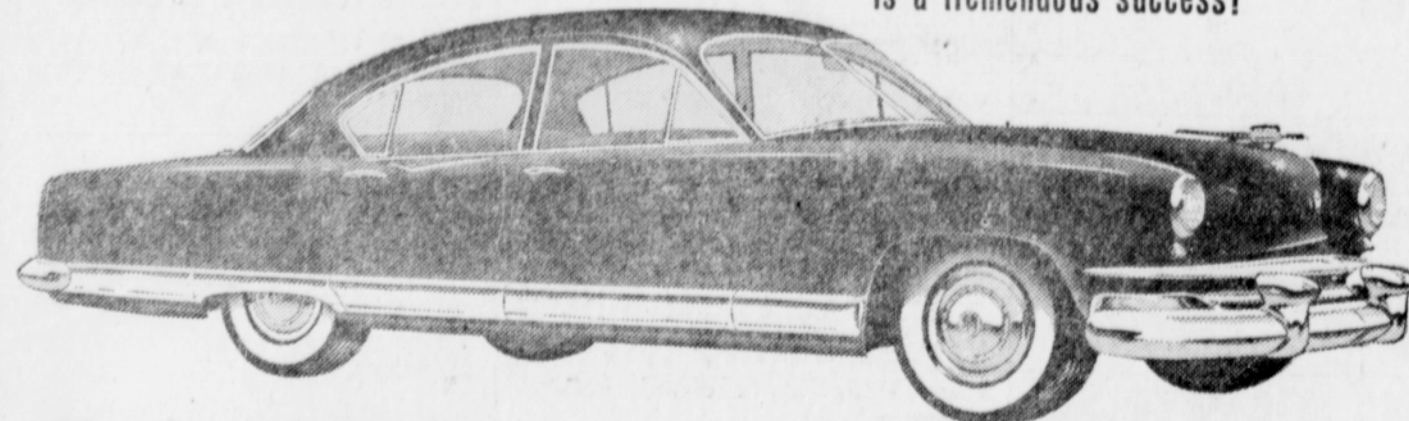
