Travel in Europe Is Not Affected By Korean War

The Korean war has had no appreciable effect on American travel to Europe so far, the Oregon State Motor Association said this week. Officials of the American Automobile Association, who recently returned from an extensive tour through Europe, report that close to 400,000 Americans are vacationing in Europe this year, about 85 percent of which is linked to the automobile.

Some cancellations are reported by airlines and steamship companies, the Association said, but most of these cancellations are quickly picked up by other travelers on the waiting list. A mid-July check of overseas airlines shows flights to Europe at nearly maximum capacity, flights from Europe at 60 percent capacity. There is no rush to get home. The United States government is taking no steps to discourage Americans from traveling abroad. The State Department has advised the AAA that the Korean war is not considered a reason enough to curtail the tourist movement to Europe or to cause concern for Americans who are now on the continent.

The Association reported that motor travel in Oregon is showing a substantial increase over that of last year, probably in the neighborhood of 20 percent. Resort areas are getting a good play and the Association advises advance reservations for national park areas and popular resort areas, if they are to be visited on weekends or holidays.

3/4 cup finely cut bacon

3 tablespoons finely cut onion

1 1/2 cups canned, cream style corn

1/4 teaspoon salt

few grains pepper

2 unseasoned eggs

1/4 cup Fat Milk

Cook bacon slowly until crisp. Drain off fat; save bacon. Put 2 tablesp.

fat back into skillet. Add onion and cook slowly 5 min. Add corn, salt and pepper. Heat to boiling. Add all at once the eggs and milk. Cook and stir over low heat about 3 min., or until mixture thickens. Add bacon. Makes 4 servings.
