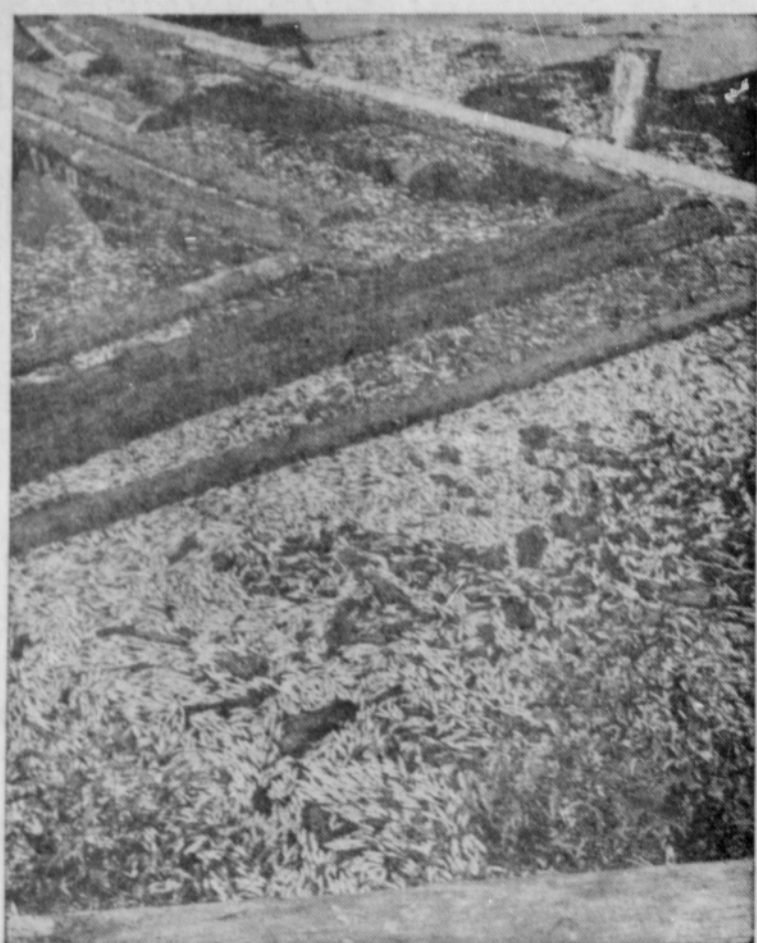

Fish Die Due To Lack of Oxygen

Residents of Keno were greeted by a powerful odor recently when thousands of dead fish covered the water of Puckett and Scherer's mill pond in the Klamath river as a result of lack of oxygen in the water.

The chief loss occurred among the Klamath lake chub group, a few perch, small catfish and suckers. There were no reports of any bass or trout among the casualties. Usually, trout are the first to suffer in attacks of this kind.

It is believed that the oxygen deficiency was caused by the excessive amount of bark and mill refuse getting into the stream from the mills which use the river for storage of logs. Organic material that may have escaped from the sewerage treatment plants of the city of Klamath Falls also was blamed.

The situation was cleared up several days later.

Owners of the mill pond are Ray Scherer and O. K. Puckett. Mrs. Puckett is the daughter of Mrs. L. J. McLaughlin of Cottage Grove.

Drain Man Killed By Rifle Bullet

The body of Eldred Kenneth Hoodentyle, 38, of Drain was found Sunday five miles west of Drain on the Hardscrabble creek road, dead from a rifle wound.

Apparently the rifle wound was self-inflicted, according to reports from the state police and District Attorney Robert Davis. The body was taken to Stearns mortuary in Oakland.

The body was found by Gene Delauney of Drain, who notified Deputy Sheriff, Vern Pouncey, who in turn notified state police.

Fire Destroys Saginaw Home

Fire Sunday morning leveled a frame house and plumbing shop in Saginaw while the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Oakley, were on a picnic.

Home and contents were a total loss although neighbors managed to save some of the plumbing equipment. It is believed that the blaze was caused by leaking gas ignited by a pilot light. The house was partially covered by insurance.

The Cottage Grove fire truck which answered the call was recalled to the area later in the afternoon to extinguish flames from the earlier fire which had jumped the highway and were threatening the Bart Johnson home and adjoining timber.

Other calls during the week were to fight grass fires in the vicinity of Cottage Grove.

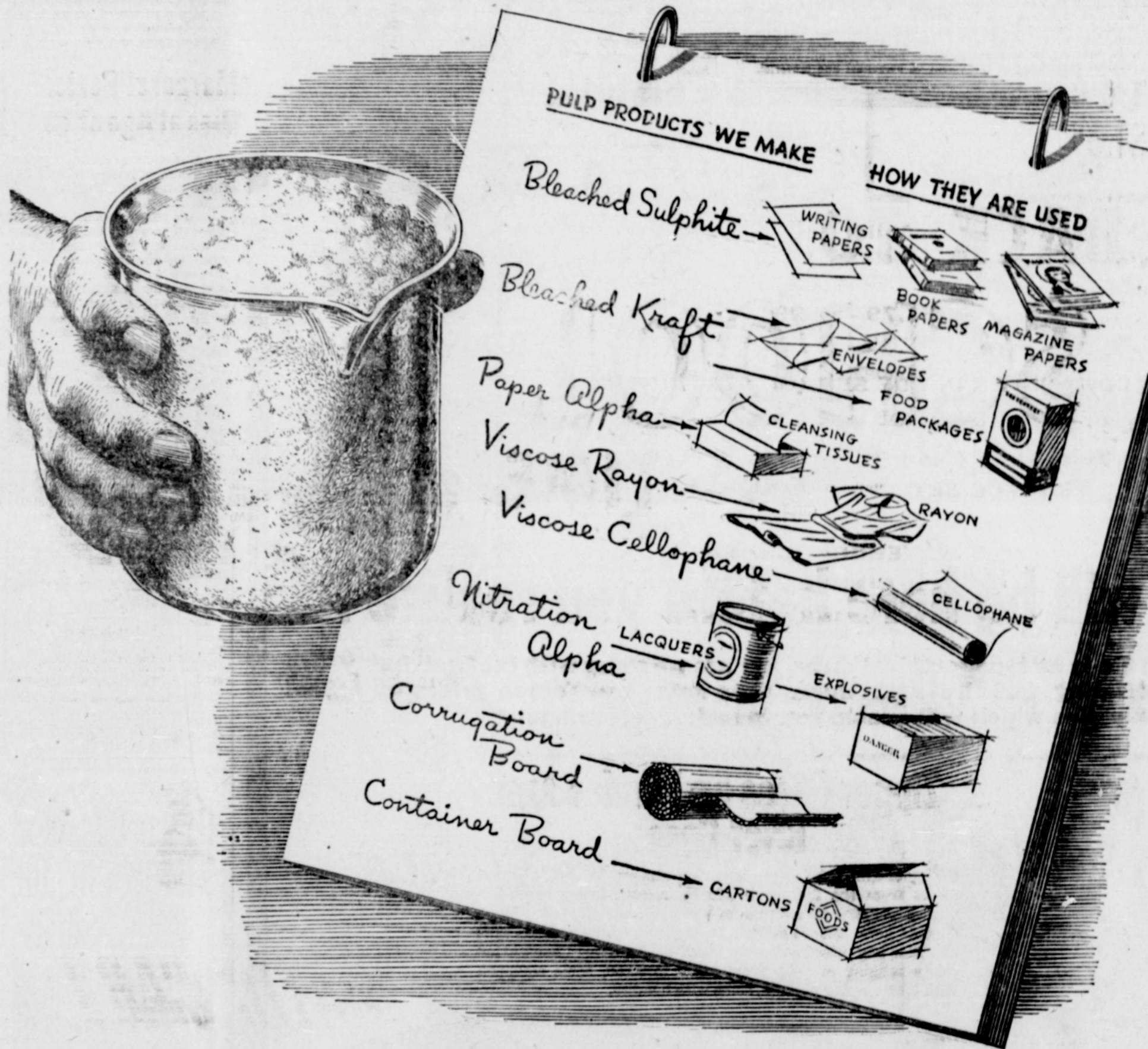
