

Building Supplies Won't Be Curtailed, Present Plans Say

The defense production program now under way will not require any such drastic curtailment of home building and other civilian construction as was put into effect during World War II, according to Ed Green, materials dealer of Creswell and member of the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association.

"Although the supply of steel, copper, lumber, and other strategic materials used in housing and other building will be lower than in the last few years because of the allocations program," Green said "there should be enough of all materials to permit a considerable amount of private construction, including repair and modernization work, unless defense production is stepped considerably beyond the

levels now being contemplated in Washington." "The latest information indicates that the partial war mobilization program now under way will require construction of relatively few large war plants and far fewer barracks and war housing developments than were put up during the second World War," he added, "because most of those facilities remain available for use in this emergency. Thus, the demand for building materials for defense purposes promises to be considerably less than it was then."

Navy Calls For More Chaplains

One hundred Naval Reserve Commissions are available to civilian chaplains who would consider active duty if needed. Applications are also being accepted for regular Navy commissions. August Accidents Kill 18 in State

Oregon's mid-August traffic death toll has surpassed the number recorded at the same time last month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Friday. July deaths reached 53 at the latest count, heaviest loss for that month in the state's history.

August accidents thus far have claimed 18 lives as against ten in mid-July. Fourteen were killed in smash-ups taking place on rural roadways, most of them the result of collisions or loss of control at high speed.

Newberry said the 1950 toll to date is 212 dead, exceeding last year at this time by 47. He warned that the Labor Day week end, extending four days for many persons, will bring still another period of acute highway danger.

The secretary appealed for redoubled alertness on the part of drivers and pedestrians alike, particularly on the highways where speed can convert any mishap into a tragedy.

"The record makes it clear that the open highway is an open invitation to death if speed gets out of hand," he declared. "This is gambling against the odds with life itself at stake."

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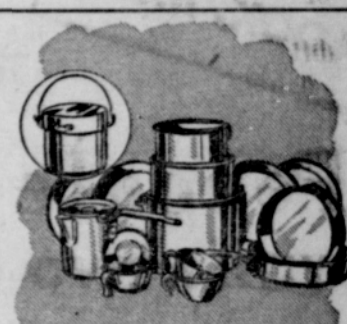
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
