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Trunk Line Sewer Is Part Of Overall Plan

When workmen start construction of the north side trunk line sewer next week, it will be the beginning of the next to the last step in Cottage Grove's overall sewage disposal plan.

First drawn up early in 1948, the plan also calls for erection of a sewage disposal plant, for which the city already has purchased six acres north of town. That will be the last step, and must be completed by January 1952.

The deadline was established by the Oregon legislature when the stream pollution law was passed.

The proposed trunk line sewer was erroneously identified last week as being for the west side of town. It should have read, north side. Further details may be found in the story below.

This act forbade cities to expel sewage into the open rivers and streams unless it first had been processed in a disposal plant.

Cottage Grove has been one of the slower cities in the Willamette valley in putting the sewage disposal plan into effect, according to Mayor F. H. Doleman, because of lack of finances. However, a special fund has been built up during the past five years by a three mill tax levy. The levy ended July 1, 1950.

Work on the 4900 foot sewer line will begin September 5, according to City Engineer L. W. Coiner, and present plans call for completion in 90 days. However, if bad weather sets in before that time, it may be necessary to wait until spring to finish it, Coiner said.

This line is the most hazardous sewer undertaking the city has attempted because of the required depth of the pipe which will average 10 feet. The work has been planned for this time of year because the water table is at the lowest level and cave-ins are least likely now.

The trunk line sewer will take the following route: begin near the intersection of Grover and N. 8th streets, follow N. 8th to Highway 99, then south to Grover, east to N. 10th, north on 10th to Chadwick, then east to N. 11th, then in a northeasterly direction along 11th to Chamberlain, then west to the east side of Highway 99, and northerly along the highway to the site of the proposed disposal plant on the south bank of the Coast fork, just east of the railroad tracks.

When it is completed, the main sewer outlet of the city will be approximately one mile from the present outlet which is near N. 8th st. Residents of north side homes will be permitted to connect with the trunk line, but probably not until next spring.

Construction work will be handled by H. C. Werner, Inc., of Eugene, whose bid of \$24,450.26 was lowest submitted last week when the city council called for bids. In all, six firms participated in the bidding. Werner has had a great deal of experience in work of this nature, according to Coiner, and is well recommended by others in the construction field.

The pipe will be 27 inch reinforced concrete with concrete manholes and will be laid on a gravel base. According to the agreement, the city will purchase the pipe and the contractor will furnish all other material. Cost of the pipe is \$14,201.30.

Plans and specifications for the trunk line sewer were drawn up by the engineering firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes, and Merryfield of Corvallis. The overall plan, submitted in 1948, was designed by Watkins and Harvey of Medford.

Head of County Community Chest Drive Is Appointed

General chairman of the 1951 Lane County Community Chest campaign will be Philip C. Tillman of Eugene. The appointment was announced by Walter Garrett, president of the Chest.

Date for the actual campaign has not been definitely set yet, but probably will be held in November.

The campaign raises funds for welfare agencies in the county, along with the state agencies. There are 12 Chest agencies in Lane County, and 35 in the state. Tillman, meanwhile, will appoint division chairmen and other committee heads and plan for the campaign with the chest advisory committee, consisting of Calvin Smith, Oluf Houghlum and Alton F. Baker.

In addition to raising funds for the usual list of welfare organizations, youth development groups and health improvement projects, funds will be raised this year for the "Associated Services for the Armed Forces," the organization formerly known as the USO. The service for military men is being reactivated nationally, Garrett explained, and Lane County will be expected to bear its share of the cost.

"Our aim," Garrett said, "is to raise funds for all of these agencies in a single campaign. This, as in previous years, will prevent a great deal of confusion and promote efficient service to the community through the chest agencies."

Elder Donald Lee Tells Experiences Of Leaving Korea Before Red Invasion

Donald Lee, the son of Elder and Mrs. H. M. Lee of Cottage Grove, told of his experiences in leaving Korea, at the Seventh-day Adventist young people's meeting on August 26.

Mr. Lee was in charge of the S.D.A. publishing house in Seoul, Korea until the movements of the communist armies made it necessary for all Americans to leave. Mr. Lee and his two girls, Cheryl and Sandra, 5, along with the other American women and children, were evacuated on a Norwegian boat from Korea on June 26, and were allowed just one suitcase apiece. The rapid advance of the communists made it necessary to evacuate all American men on the following day, June 27, by air. At first the planes in the airlift carried 45 passengers each and they were allowed to take one suitcase apiece. As the communists drew closer to the airport, 62 persons were loaded onto each plane with most of the baggage being left behind strewn

Auto Mishaps Over Labor Day Weekend May Set Record

Labor Day, the summer's final holiday which begins Friday and extends through Monday, could easily be the most destructive and tragic holiday week end in Oregon's history. That was the statement made this week by Captain Walter L. Lansing, director of the state traffic safety division, Salem. Lansing pointed out that traffic deaths this year are already running far above fatalities at this time last year, with 212 reported dead through mid-August by the Secretary of State's office. Fifty-three died in traffic mishaps last month and incomplete reports for August indicate that this month's death toll will surpass the July toll, Lansing said.

Thousands of Oregonians are expected to take advantage of the last four-day summer holiday to make trips to the beach, the mountains or to the state fair, which opens in Salem, Monday, Sept. 4.

Lansing asserted that the traffic load created by the pleasure seekers makes it absolutely necessary for motorists to drive carefully or face the possibility of a fatal accident. Drinking and complete carelessness on the part of drivers and pedestrians are the most frequent causes of holiday death accidents, Lansing warned.

VACATION IS ALMOST OVER — SCHOOL BEGINS NEXT TUESDAY

Here's a roundup of what's going to be there: AGRICULTURE: With more entries than ever before, livestock barns are crowded to capacity. Marion County Agent Ben Nowell, in charge of dairy cattle, said there is a surprisingly large number of dairy goats, as well as cows. All classifications are well filled, and there'll be almost 5,000 head present.

Land products will have a well populated show, as will the county exhibits. Counties entered to date are Lane, Marion, Crook, Linn, Jefferson, Hood River, Harney, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook.

FOUR-H: The younger generation will be well represented in 4-H and FFA competition. Several thousand youngsters will have entries in a full list of classifications in both groups.

EXHIBITS: There'll be a full exhibit of farm machinery along machinery row. The machinery shed will be well filled, as will the open area adjacent.

ENTERTAINMENT: There's a full assortment at the fair this year. Twice daily there'll be free vaudeville acts on the midway, at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. The Salem Municipal Band, official Fair Band, will play a concert daily as well as accompany the acts.

Every evening except Sunday the horse show and rodeo will be presented in the horse stadium. Christensen Brothers Rodeo will be attended by leading cow punchers, with points won here counting heavily toward the national title.

The northwest's outstanding horses will be on display in the show ring, competing for the horse show trophies.

Sunday afternoon there will be auto races on the track, featuring "Hard Tops," stock cars with racing motors added.

Ashley Cook and his orchestra will play for old time dances nightly in the dance pavilion, immediately after the Water Folies.

THE RACES: The Oregon State Fair racing season will feature the top horses of the northwest in a six day pari-mutuel meet. Feature races will be the Labor Day Handicap on Monday, The Governor's Handicap on Wednesday, and the Au Revoir on Saturday.

In addition to a full list of running races, there'll be two harness races added on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Sunday, September third, will see exhibition racing, featuring harness and quarter horses.

GENERAL: Saturday, September ninth is kiddies day, with every ride on the populous midway reduced to nine cents for children under 12. Kiddieland, the enclosed play area, will operate with added rides for the tots.

Fair admission is still fifty cents, with children under 12 free.
