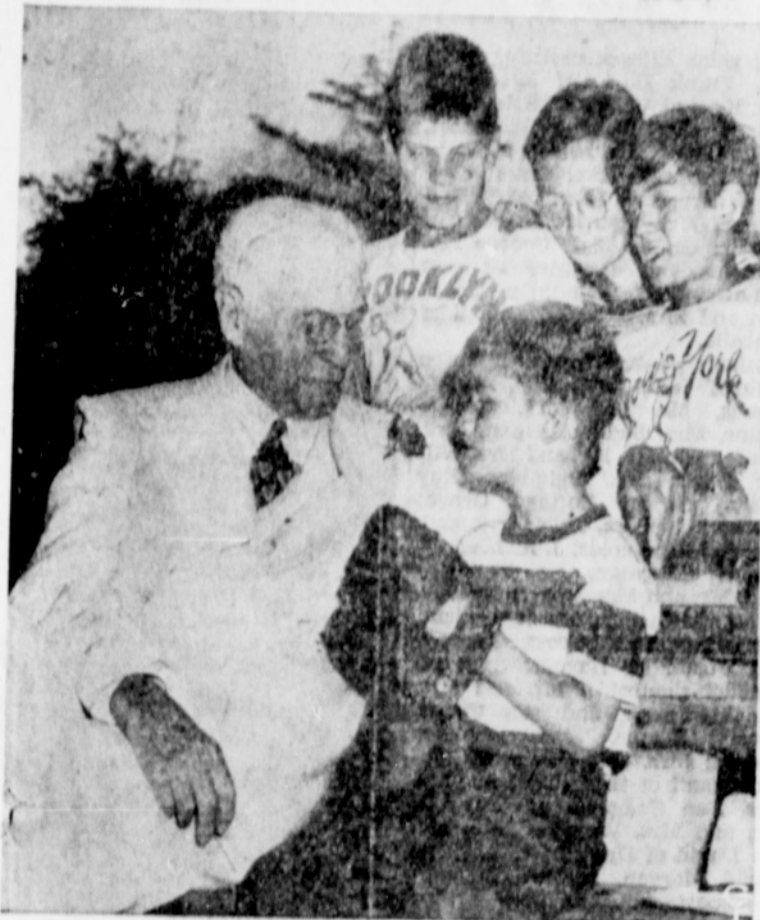


**CONGRATULATIONS FOR BARUCH**

**Chasing Antelope in Airplane Arouses Hunters Near Hart Mt.**

Game violations during the opening days of the seven-day (Aug. 19 to 25 inclusive) antelope season in southeastern Oregon have been more numerous than during last year's season.

The pilots of two metal planes, operating in conjunction with ground parties, reportedly drove and harassed antelope in the area south of Hart mountain. Buzzing low over rims and basins to route the antelope, the two planes aroused the anger of many a legitimate hunter, who had his quarry hazed away from him, often after hours of patient stalking.

One irate hunter was flown to Lakeview by Oregon State Game commission personnel so that he could sign a complaint against the offenders who have been charged with hunting and molesting game animals with the aid of a mechanical vehicle. Many other hunters in the area volunteered to testify as witnesses. Apparently a drive had been organized in conjunction with the two planes, for they were observed ferrying hunters to stations on a dry lake edge. It was then reported that the planes drove antelope from the surrounding country to the waiting hunters.

Several sportsmen, knowing that the Game commission had a patrol plane in the area, placed full blame upon the commission when in effect the commission's plane was making every effort to avoid disturbing the antelope.

**54 Report as Lions Begin Grid Practice**

Equipment was issued to 54 prospective griders last week as practice for the 1950 Lion football season got underway. Half of the candidates are inexperienced, according to Bob Dusenberry, head coach.

Regular practices are held every weekday from 7 to 9 p.m. with individual and small groups working out each evening. The coaching staff is still urging any boys interested to turn out for these pre-season drills.

It is still early to make any prediction concerning starting line-ups, as changes have been made each night for signal drill. Guard Ray Simonsen, center Wayne Schmitt, and end Ben Hilliker have been line fixtures with the other positions having many changes.

The two tackle positions are in a three way fight between Don Mooney, Charles Marlin and Lowry Hoyer. The vacant end spot has Ray Duer, Richard Wicks and Marvin Hayes as close contestants. The remaining guard spot is wide open with Jim Wilson, Dick Diller, and Don Bost working for it.

Makeup of the backfield also is a toss-up. Sonny Hayes and Jim Webb, two of the returning regulars from last year, are on the doubtful list with knee injuries. Wes Malcolm and Bill McBea, along with Doyle Higdon and Dave Inel, are seeing most of the action in current signal drills.

Norm Carey, former Oregon State basketball star and a member of the Stewart Chevrolet AAU club for the past two seasons, has been ordered to report for a physical examination in the Army reserve. He holds a commission of first lieutenant in the Infantry and served three years overseas in World War II.

Oregon State and Michigan State will be clashing on the gridiron for the fifth time when they meet in an inter-sectional opener at East Lansing on September 23. The Beavers have won twice; MSC once; and one game ended in a 7-7 deadlock. Each club has totaled exactly the same number of points in four games, 73.
