Aluminum Roof Tips Given by OSC Specialist

To prevent galvanic action or corrosion, keep aluminum roofing, siding, gutters, and flashing from coming in contact with other metals such as copper, steel or lead.

This building tip is from M. G. Huber, Oregon State college extension agricultural engineer. Where contact is impossible to avoid, he recommends that the aluminum and other metals be separated by a thick coating of asphalt to prevent corrosion from taking place.

The warning also applies to nails.

Huber says they should be driven deeply into the wood to avoid the danger of contact.

Where aluminum is used over old roofing, a layer of saturated asphalt felt, or nailing strips horizontally on the old roof is recommended to keep the new roofing from coming in contact with old and loose nails.

Aluminum is available in various thicknesses. For example, a 24 U. S. standard gauge is 24 thousandths of an inch thick, while 26 U. S. standard gauge is 19 thousandths of an inch thick. Since gauge numbers may be confusing, Huber suggests that sheet metal roofing of any kind be ordered by thousands of inch thickness rather than by gauge.

Even on new applications where tight sheeting is used, use of asphalt felt is recommended. Finally, Huber suggests that vegetable material such as leaves be kept cleaned out of aluminum gutters to prevent corrosion from taking place.

Apples supply some vitamin A and varying amounts of vitamin C. They also furnish minerals, organic acids, bulk and pectin.

Expect OSC Staff To Remain Intact For Coming Year

Oregon State College—Prospects are good for keeping the staff intact for the coming year, and for students to continue their education in nearly normal numbers despite the partial mobilization reports E. B. Lemon, dean of administration and acting president in the absence of President A. L. Strand on a federal assignment.

A special committee consisting of deans Paul Dunn, George Gleason and F. A. Gillilan, with Associate Dean Earl Price is assisting in keeping up-to-date on all governmental rulings applying to staff and student status.

Only a limited number of the many reservists on the staff are expected to be called unless the emergency is prolonged, since most are above the age limit of those now sought by the government. Deferment of younger staff reservists will depend on individual circumstances.

The present draft law provides that local boards may defer students who are actually enrolled until the end of the college year. Dean Lemon emphasizes, however, that nothing can be done to obtain such deferment, either in the case of reservists or students subject to the draft, until the man is actually called to report.

Polio Rate Runs High In Oregon; Precautions Urged

Several simple precautions against poliomyelitis were re-emphasized by an Oregon official of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today as warm weather drove the incidence of the disease to new high for the year.

Joe F. Klevit, Portland, state representative for the Foundation, pointed out that Oregon's polio rate is running about 30 per cent above the 1949 incidence. He urged the continuation of such everyday preventive measures as avoidance of over-fatigue and sudden chilling, assurance of adequate rest and sleep, strict observance of fundamental rules of cleanliness and non-use of utensils, toys and implements belonging to other children.

Routine daily checking on each child's health for early notice of such symptoms as headaches, nausea, muscle soreness and fever also was advised.

NEUTRALIZATION OF FORMOSA—A study of the map of the Far East, in the light of Communist methods of operation and the lessons of World War II, will show the importance of the decision to neutralize Formosa. Airfields on that island are only 400 miles from targets on Okinawa, a little farther from targets in the Philippines, and less than 800 miles from targets in Japan. Along with these points and Indo-China, Formosa might be in the first line of defense against Communist aggression in the Far East. If the Communists should seize Formosa now, they would not only break that line but also pave the way to conquest of the other points. Remembering the long years of costly, bloody island-hopping in World War II, it is easy to picture the hard road back that the forces of freedom would face.

Formosa is separated from the mainland of China by a strait from 90 to 200 miles wide. An island about 235 miles long and from 70 to 90 miles wide, it is about as large as Massachusetts and Connecticut combined and has a population of 7,000,000.

Book On Atomic Defense Is Issued By Government

The American people are principally interested in children, aviation, and gardening, as disclosed by sales figures of U. S. Government publications, but officials of the Government Printing Office today made ready to add a new best seller to its list as purchasers lined up at the Government Printing Office Book Store in Washington, and mail orders began arriving from all over the country for the new Atomic Energy Commission publication entitled "The Effects of Atomic Weapons."

This publication contains previously unpublished details on atomic explosions and is of primary interest to persons engaged in civilian defense, the building trades, and all others vitally interested in what happens when an atom bomb explodes.

The book, prepared by the Atomic Energy Commission from non-confidential, scientific, and technical information, presents the most informative and authoritative data that can be disclosed and is now for sale to the public by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, at \$1.25 a copy.
