New Slip Cover Material Has Been Put On the Market

Return of youngsters to September classrooms may offer mothers an opportunity to touch up their worn chairs with new slipcovers, suggests Mrs. Myrtle Carter, Oregon State college extension home furnishings specialist.

Most homemakers will be looking for labor saving fabrics.

One attractive textile on the market this fall is a cotton with a water repellent finish applied at the factory. Water base stains will roll off this material. However greasy or oily spots must still be removed with a grease remover. The special finish is permanent giving protection through many washings and dry cleanings.

Fabrics with this special finish will make useful slip covers, draperies, bedspreads, and chair cushions. The heavier materials are appropriate for upholstery. The textile is available in plain, floral and modern abstract designs.

Mrs. Carter says another newcomer on the shelf is a glazed heavy weight cotton, suggestive of chintz. This material is vat dyed, pre-shrunk and guaranteed not to shrink more than 2 per cent. The glaze is permanent.

The fire occurred about the time workers were returning home and about 100 volunteers assembled before the fire was finally checked.

The chicken house was the only building on the place with no in-

surance and it was the only building destroyed.
