## CG Gridders Travel to Sweet Home Friday; Currin Field Lights Arrive

Early season injuries which have hit several key players on the Cottage Grove high school football squad have dimmed local hopes of an easy victory over Sweet Home Friday night. The game will be played in Sweet Home.

Guards Ray Simonsen and Sonny Hayes, and halfback Bill McBee, of the first string, and guard John Bash of the second string, all have been sidelined by injuries. Furthermore, the trick knee of Jim Webb has not shown sufficient improvement to allow him to play this week.

For replacements, Coach Bob Dusenberry has named Dick Piller and Jim Wilson to take over the guard spots, and Dave Imel will hold down the position at left halfback. Otherwise, the starting lineup will be the same as for the St. Francis game; Ray Duer and Ben Hilliker, ends; Charles Marlin and Lowry Hoyer, tackles; Wayne Schmitt, center; and Wes Malcolm, Ed Tryck, Dick Dobbins, and Imel will be in the backfield.

This past week Dusenberry has been stressing pass defense in the practice sessions. Because of the unusual number of injuries, he has decided to cut out contact work for a while.

During the B squad game with Eugene Monday, outstanding performers for the Lions were Ken Sloan and Clarence Smith. Dusenberry stated that these players may see action in the varsity Sweet Home tilt Friday.

Saturday at 2:30 p.m. the Lion B squad will play Pleasant Hill on the local gridiron. All townspeople are urged to attend.

The first night game to be played on Currin field under the new lights will take place Oct. 6 when the Lions will tangle with the Eugene Axemen. Dedication ceremonies for the field also will be held at that time.

## REGISTER NOW IF YOU EXPECT TO VOTE NOVEMBER 7

If you are not registered in the proper precinct, you'll miss your chance to vote on the general election November 7th. Deadline for registering is October 6th, or thirty days prior to the election. If you have moved from one precinct to another, changed your name as in the case of a good many married women, or have become of voting age since the last election, you'll need to register.

You can register at the office of John Wells, justice of the peace, room 3 in the Stewart building. Or you can register at the county court house in Eugene.

The long awaited lights and fixtures for the new football stadium at Cottage Grove High School arrived Tuesday of this week and plans are going ahead for early installation.

Construction of the stadium is progressing rapidly and plans are being made for the dedication of George Currin field Oct. 6 with the Eugene High game. Because of the potential strength shown by both teams to date, this game is expected to draw a capacity crowd along with the added attraction of the field dedication.

Dedication ceremonies will be held at half time and are expected to be brief but impressive without long speeches.

The \$15,000 bond election conducted Monday of this week for the purpose of providing funds to finish the stadium carried by a unanimous vote of 31-0.

They consist of a large badge done in the school colors of blue and gold with the words "Cottage Grove Lions" printed on them. A blue and gold ribbon hangs from the badge suspending a miniature football.

The emblems were presented with the idea of giving the students something nice to wear to games and to give high school athletics a boost. The football can be taken off in other sport seasons with the student retaining a very good booster badge and ribbons.

## Administrator of Hospital Is Named

F. L. Morris, administrator of Portland General hospital for the past seven years, will be the administrator of the new Cottage Grove hospital now under construction, it was announced this week by Floyd Githens, chairman of the hospital employment committee.

With twelve years of experience in managing hospitals behind him, Mr. Morris was administrator of Bozeman Deaconess hospital at Bozeman, Mont., before he came to Portland.

Temporarily located at the Cottage Grove Hotel, he expects to have an office soon in one of the buildings at the hospital site which formerly was occupied by the veterans housing office. At present, he is trying to secure necessary hospital equipment in order to be ready for the proposed opening around the first of the year.

The first local boy to be killed in action in the Korean War was Carl David Frost, 18, son of Mrs. Nelreatha Frost Chambers of California. Carl enlisted in the Army in July 1949, and in July of this year was sent to Korea with the Fifth Infantry. Mrs. Chambers was notified September 12 of his death.

Frost had been a resident of Cottage Grove for many years and attended schools here.

### Tillamook Cowboy Wins Top Honors At Amateur Rodeo

With a first in calf roping and a third in steer riding, Ernest Mann of Tillamook was proclaimed all-around champion cowboy Sunday at the amateur rodeo and roundup sponsored by the Cottage Grove Riding club.

For his achievement, Mann was awarded a trophy donated by Community Jewelers and a headstall given by Gasper Shoe Shop. Top money winner was Mac Berry who placed first in steer riding but did not qualify for the all-around title since he entered just the one event.

Preparedness to meet any emergency that may come to Cottage Grove was demonstrated Tuesday night at the meeting of the local civilian defense planning board as members presented reports of progress made since organization of the board a month ago.

### Woman Sues City For \$10,000

A suit asking damages of \$10,000 from the city of Cottage Grove was filed in Circuit court last week by Martha F. Clark, who claims she was permanently injured when she stepped in a hole in the street last April.

In addition to the city, the complaint also names as defendants Mayor F. H. Doleman, Councilmen Joe Bricher, Elmer Kent, Richard L. Thwing, Oscar Smith, Z. A. Coop, and Amil Thies, and City Engineer L. W. Coiner.

According to the complaint, the plaintiff stepped into a hole "approximately six inches deep and fifteen inches in diameter" while crossing Sixth street at the Main street intersection. As a result of the fall it is claimed she sustained a broken hip and sprained ankle and that these injuries are permanent.

It is charged that the city was negligent in keeping the crosswalk in good condition.

The Eugene law firm of Calkins and Calkins is representing the plaintiff.

### Cecil Wood Joins Local Police Force

Cecil D. Wood, who has been connected with the Los Angeles police department for the past 22 years, has recently been added to the Cottage Grove police force, according to Chief Chester Nordstrom.

During his tenure in the California city, Wood was a member of the detective division for 16 years. He also did special police work there.
