THE BIBLE SPEAKS:

"And all the people that heard him, and the publicans, justified God being baptized with the baptism of John. But the Pharisees and lawyers rejected the counsel of God against themselves, being not baptized of him." (Luke 7:29-30)

Luke the historian said the Pharisees and lawyers rejected the counsel of God by not accepting the baptism of John. John baptized "for the remission of sins." (Lk. 3:3; Mk. 1:4) The candidates for his baptism confessed they were sinners. (Matt. 3:6) How were you baptized? Were you baptized believing you were saved before you were baptized? Hence, there was no need of baptism "for the remission of sins" and no need "confessing your sins." Did you confess "that God for Christ's sake had pardoned your sins?" Not so with those who came to John.

Jesus' baptism is "for the remission of sins." "Repent and be baptized every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins." (Acts 2:38) Having believed in Christ, repented of your sins, you must be baptized to get into Christ. "For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ." (Gal. 3:27) It will wash away your sins. "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." (Acts 22:16)

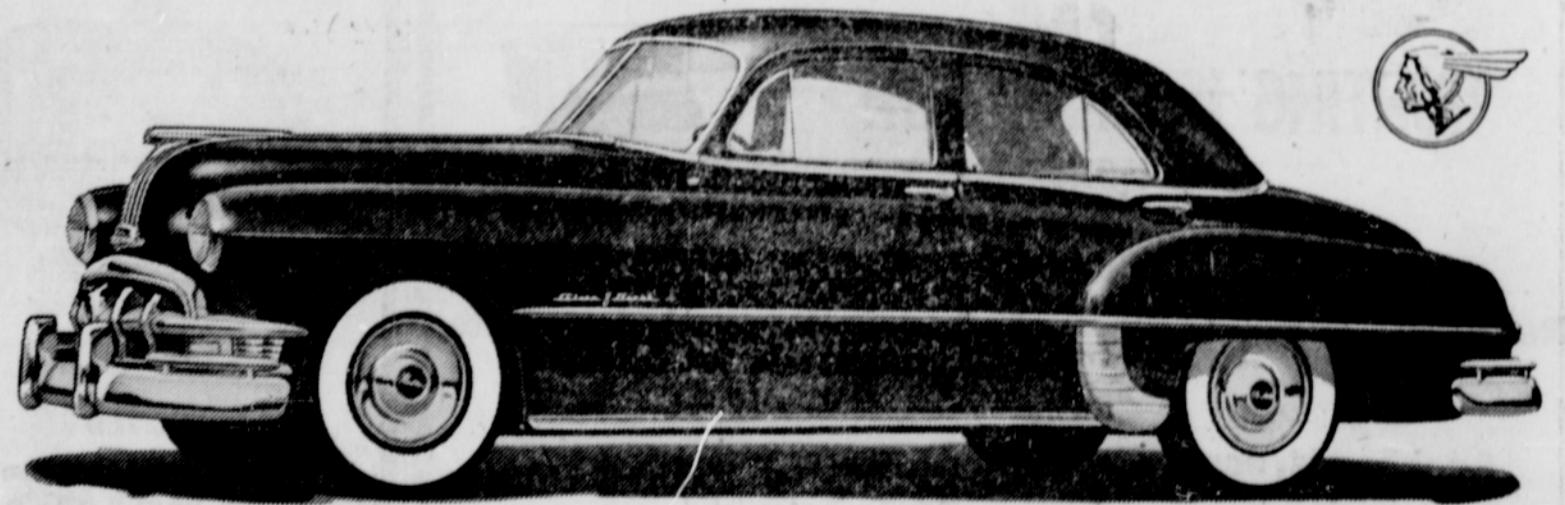
