Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m. Pacific standard time, October 2, 1950, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 20 acres within section 18, T. 22 S., R. 1 E., W.M., surveyed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 540,000 feet B.M. more or less of Douglas-fir, 30,000 feet B.M. more or less of western redcedar and 2,000 feet B.M. more or less of western hemlock and other species of sawtimber. Sealed bids accompanied by required payment received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., October 2, 1950, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for the information of all bidders. No bid of less than \$20.20 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$3.40 per M feet for western redcedar and \$3.00 per M feet for western hemlock and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.50 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$4,000.00 to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale, must accompany each sealed bid and must be shown to be in the possession of oral bidders as a

qualification for auction bidding.
