**Local Man Finds Freight Car Surplus In Eastern Yards**

Freight cars stacking up in railroad yards in the East and Midwest has been reported by Lee Nichols, local appliance dealer who has just returned from a trip to that part of the country.

In conversations with yardmasters in Chicago, Nichols learned that sometimes as many as 150 empty cars enter the terminals each day and that they are the source of headaches for the trainmen. The same situation exists in at least five major Eastern cities, Nichols said.

The grain movement has not been a big factor in the car shortage this year, according to the yardmasters Nichols talked to, because most of the grain has gone either to elevators or other storage bins. They felt that the fault lies in the method of distributing the empty cars, Nichols said.

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**37 in Kindergarten At Two Sessions**

The Cottage Grove Public School Kindergarten started classes September 6th at the Presbyterian church with an enrollment of 37 students. These children attend either the morning or afternoon session. Under the supervision of their teacher, Mrs. Elta Gray, a certified kindergarten teacher, the children learn cooperative play, routine, and self help by activities with constructive toys and planned activities such as various field trips. The equipment includes among other things a record player donated by the Lions Club and a sandbox, the lumber for which was last year donated by Sears Building Supply and built by one of the kindergarten fathers.

The tuition of \$7.50 per month is one of the lowest in the state. New enrollments are still being accepted until a maximum of 50 students is reached. You may still enroll your child by calling 639 evenings, or 714P.

The 4-year-old nursery class will open when the enrollment reaches 20, at which time a teacher and a room will be provided. So far there are 12 children enrolled in this class and others will be put on the list by calling Mrs. Carlton Woodward, phone 193L.

Because of the large kindergarten class it will be necessary to move to a larger room soon, and the Army has been selected as a very suitable place. The group will probably begin holding sessions there some time in October.
