

Lions Trounce St. Francis in Season Opener

Scoring in every quarter except one, the Cottage Grove Lions romped over the St. Francis grid team Friday afternoon, 32-0, to open the season schedule for both teams in the Willamette League.

Sparked by the fleet-footed running of backs Eddie Tryck and Dick Dobbins, the local squad showed superiority in all statistical departments. Rushing and passing netted 281 yards gained for the Lions, while the Gaels could scrape up only 98 yards. The Grovers made eight first downs, and the opposition chalked up five.

The first Lion touchdown came on the fifth play of the game, only a few minutes after the opening whistle. With the ball on the St. Francis 38 yard line, Tryck took off through his own left tackle and dashed to the goal line behind excellent blocking.

Several plays later, St. Francis fumbled on its own 30 and the ball was recovered by Lion tackle John Bash. Again the ball was given to Tryck, and this time he scooted down the sidelines for another score. Dobbins went over for the extra point to make it 13-0.

A minute before the end of the first quarter, guard Jim Wilson of the Lion squad recovered a Gael fumble on their 30. Bill McBee brought the ball to the 27, and then Tryck made his third touchdown run of the day. He handed the ball three times during the first quarter and made three touchdowns.

The second quarter was marked by fumbles and interceptions on the part of both teams, but neither was able to score. At halftime the score remained 19-0.

Toward the end of the third quarter, an 80-yard Lion drive was climaxed by a pass from Dobbins to Ben Hilliker, who was all alone on the 10 yard line when he caught the ball. A few steps took him over the line, making the score 25-0. The kick for extra point was no good.

The final Lion tally came in the fourth quarter when Doyle Higdon charged through the center of the line from the 12. Wes Malcolm kicked the extra point.

The Cottage Grove defense proved to be a solid wall for the Gael backs to try to penetrate. In the final stanza, however, fullback Bill Higgins led his team-mates down to the Lions' 25, only to lose the ball on downs.

Oregon Leads In Turkey Wager



Sir Keep Oregon Green, giant broad-breasted bronze turkey, seems pleased in this interview with Sheila Prialoux, 12-year-old Portland State Guard, as he learns that Oregon is far ahead of Washington state in the contest for lowest number of man-caused forest fires. Oregon had only 566 man-caused forest fires to September 1st, while Washington had run up a total of 856 in the same period.

Sir KOG is the prize turkey wagered by Governor Douglas McKay of Oregon with Governor Arthur Langlie of Washington, who has posted a similar turkey as forfeit if his state loses the wager.

Loren Johnson, Scappoose turkey grower, who donated Sir KOG to Governor McKay, is holding the big bird which already weighs 28 pounds and will top 40 pounds by Thanksgiving.

Keep Oregon Green officials have joined in the spirit of the friendly competition between the two states with a plea to Oregonians to use every precaution to help prevent forest fires. A special plea was addressed to hunters, who last year started more than 100 forest fires during the first week of deer season, when campfires were left to spread and cigarettes were flipped into dry forest fuel.

Sage Hen Placed In Former Haunts

Arid sage lands in Wasco county may again be populated by sage hen. Eighty-seven of the large grouse were recently trapped from sage hen concentrations in Malheur county and transported to the Wasco county homestead by agents of the Oregon State Game commission. Once found throughout most eastern Oregon sage country, the birds are now restricted mainly to southeastern Oregon.

This is the largest number of sage hen yet transplanted by the Game commission in its program to re-establish the birds on ranges from which they have long vanished.

In recent years, Oregon's sage hen population has risen sharply, and the Game commission hopes to continue trapping sage hen and releasing them in many of their former haunts.

Smith River Area Closed to Hunters

Following a special public hearing, the Oregon State Game commission recently excluded the Smith river area between the Siuslaw and Umpqua rivers from the hunter's choice deer season on October 21 and 22.

Briefly, the closure boundaries are as follows: The Siuslaw river from Alma to the Pacific ocean is the north boundary, and the Pacific is the west boundary. The Umpqua river upstream to Elkton and State highway 38 from Elkton to its junction with U. S. highway 99 at Drain forms the south boundary. The county road from highway 99 to Gunter and the forest trail from Gunter to Alma forms the east boundary of the closure.

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Many of the lakes in this area including East and Paulina were closed Sept. 15. Those that remain open include Wickiup reservoir, Todd lake, and Irish and Taylor lakes. Waldo lake is closed. There is still fishing in the Square lake group - Elk, Cults, Mud, and Devil's lake. The Metolius has produced limits of 12 to 14 inch rainbow.

Trotting on the Deschutes river in the Harper bridge area has yielded many nice catches. Fly fishing has been good and should continue so through the warm weather. The little Deschutes is low and clear and fly fishing has yielded nice browns. The lower Deschutes has produced good catches of large rainbow.

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Hap Wolfard Makes Perfect Score in Shoot

An ambition of every trap-shooter was realized by H. L. (Hap) Wolfard Sunday at the shoot sponsored by the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club when he made a perfect score in the 100-shot 16-yard event.

In addition to winning the 100-16-yard competition, Wolfard also came out on top in his class B station as well as earning the best score for both days of the shoot.

In the handicap shoot, J. B. Troeh of Eugene won the right to have his name engraved on the W. M. Harpole Memorial Cup by besting Roger Wolfe of Springfield in three shoot-offs. The trophy was established this year in memory of W. M. Harpole, leading Cottage Grove trap shooter who died last fall while on a hunting trip in eastern Oregon. The cup will be awarded each year to the best handicap shooter during this annual shoot.

In the regular shoot Sunday, Emerson Brickey of Eugene was tied with Troeh and Wolfe at 95, but lost out in the first shoot-off after he missed six birds. Wolfe and Troeh each lost three birds.

Each shooter hit 24 out of 25 birds in the second shoot-off, and in the third, Wolfe lost out by one bird when he missed four, and Troeh three.

Outstanding shooters from the Cottage Grove club in addition to Wolfard were Leo Rickard, who shot a 98 Saturday and 97 Sunday; Glen Wicks, who chalked up 97 Sunday; and Frank Miller, who placed third in class C competition Sunday with a 95.

There are two sets of brothers on the 1950 Oregon State football team. Herm and Jim Clark from Honolulu play side by side on the first string line as right tackle and right guard, respectively. Wes Hogland of Bend is a letterman right guard. His brother Doug, a left tackle, is rated one of the brightest sophomore prospects on the squad.

Probably the most unusual first name on the 1950 Oregon State football squad belongs to Bud Woodward, rugged fullback, whose real given name is Seabrook.
