\$22,000 Offered At Horse Show

North Portland, Ore.—More than \$22,000 in cash awards will be given at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition Oct. 6-14, the West's finest horse show of the year, according to Horse Show Manager Harrison Cutler.

The large amount of cash offered will attract outstanding horses from California, Utah, Washington, Texas, Colorado, Nevada and New Mexico, he said. At least 300 horses will be on hand.

Senator Wayne Morse already has entered Sir Laurel Guy and will come from Washington to drive the roadster personally.

Outstanding cutting horses from scattered states will be seen in a repetition of the event that proved so popular in its initial showing at the Pacific International last year. These highly trained horses select a cow from a herd at the end of the arena and match every move of the cow in preventing its frantic efforts to return to the herd.

Feature of the Horse Show this year will be championship indoor polo with 3-man teams. Boise, Yakima, Spokane and Portland are already entered and a fifth squad will round out the tournament.

CORVALLIS—Oregon State's Beavers, lacking in depth but strong in spirit, will leave Thursday for the opening game of the season against Michigan State at East Lansing Saturday.

Coach Kip Taylor's gridders have been drilling lightly this week, after a rugged regular-game scrimmage last Saturday. Although far from a polished outfit, the Orange-men have shown consistent improvement and are in good physical shape for the Spartan contest.

Gene Taft, the junior college transfer, has continued to shine in sessions this week. The fleet-footed left halfback got off to a slow start, but is beginning to look more and more like the player who stole the spring practice spotlight.

Taylor has absolutely no problem at fullback. Sophomore Sam Baker, the breakaway type of runner, has a slight edge over Bud Woodward, a jaycee transfer who specializes at line plunging. Both are great competitors.

Lettermen Ralph Carr and Bill Sheffield are still waging a tight battle for the starting right half post. Gene Morrow has the quarterback spot all sewed up and will guide the Orange offensive against MSC.

The line is pretty much a veteran group. Don Niblett and John Thomas at ends, Capt. Arvid Niemi and Herm Clark at tackles, Don Zarosinski and Jim Clark at guards and Fred Sutherland at center. All but Sutherland lettered 1949.

The Beavers will leave three capable performers at home because of injuries. Right tackle Jim Harker, right guard Fred Burri and left half Bob Cornolison form the trio. Pete Elliott, end coach, will scout the Oregon-UCLA game at Los Angeles, but all other members of the coaching staff will take the Michigan State trip.
