### Original Styling, Utility Mark Henry J Models



ORIGINAL STYLING and functional design throughout identify the Henry J and Henry J Deluxe, Kaiser-Frazer's newest 1951 models. Less than 60 inches in height, the low-priced sedans are smartly styled without "frills" or excessive ornamentation. A major utility feature is the arrangement of the rear seat, which folds forward to make a level cargo floor and provide a spacious 50 cubic feet of storage area. Sue Doyle, Detroit model, demonstrates the convenient accessibility of the cargo floor. Illustrated is the six-cylinder deluxe sedan.

### Henry J Is Latest Addition to Low Priced Car Market

Low initial cost plus great operating economy and exceptional performance are the 1-2-3 features of the all-new Henry J sedan models which go on display at Kaiser-Frazer dealerships throughout the country this week.

The Henry J will be put on display at noon Thursday at Hansen Bros. showroom in Cottage Grove, it has been announced by Homer and Paul Hansen, local Kaiser-Frazer dealers. Doors will remain open Thursday, Friday, and Saturday until 9 p.m. to allow public inspection of the new car.

Buyers will have a choice of the four cylinder Henry J and the Henry J Deluxe, six-cylinder model offering greater styling refinements. Both engines are new high-compression "Kaiser Super-sonic" L-head types.

Edgar F. Kaiser, K-F president, said prices, to be disclosed Thursday, will be the lowest in America for a full size sedan, thus marking the first full scale new competition in the low priced auto market in nearly a quarter-century.

Basically, it is the car that Henry J. Kaiser, board chairman, envisioned when Kaiser-Frazer was formed in 1945. Developed on the basis of postwar engineering advances, the Henry J models profited from prior years of experimentation with 50 prototypes built under Mr. Kaiser's personal direction.

The company reported that in the most extensive pre-marketing tests ever given a new automobile the Henry J demonstrated its ability to leap from zero to 50 miles an hour in 10 seconds, and to 60 in 14 seconds.

An impartial report on remarkable operating economy was furnished earlier this month when the six-cylinder model delivered 34 miles to the gallon in gasoline mileage tests conducted by the American Automobile Association.

The new model provides luggage capacity of 50.3 cubic feet achieved through a utility feature which allows the rear seat back to be folded forward and anchored in place as part of the trunk floor. The convenience of the folding seat feature eliminates need for the traditional rear trunk opening.

Arrival of the Henry J models marks K-F's first challenge in the low priced field. Including them, the company is now nearing production of its first half-million cars. Popular and medium priced models in the 1951 Kaiser and Frazer lines have been in production since last spring.

### Hunters Reminded To Report Deer

Hunters for the third season are using separate deer tags to which are attached report cards, which must be completed and returned to the Game Commission within 30 days after the close of the season. The information furnished on the cards makes it possible for the Commission to analyze the annual kill. In 1949, out of 163,628 tag holders, 57,260 reported killing a deer, a success ratio of 35 per cent.

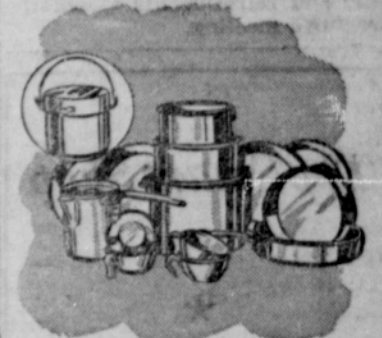

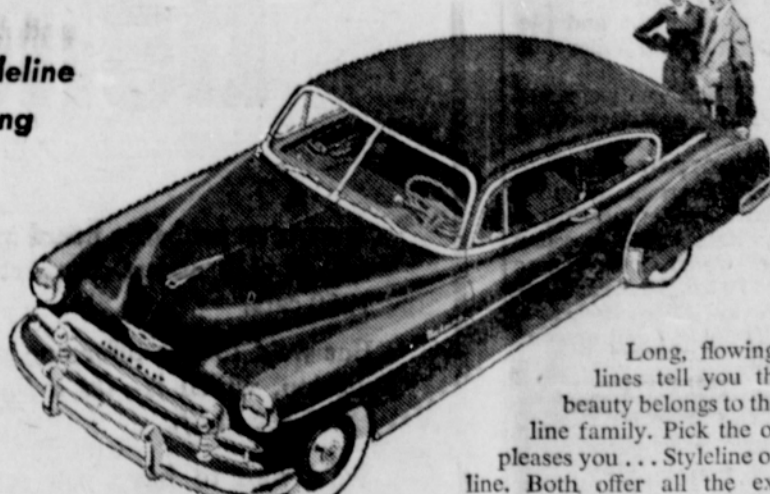

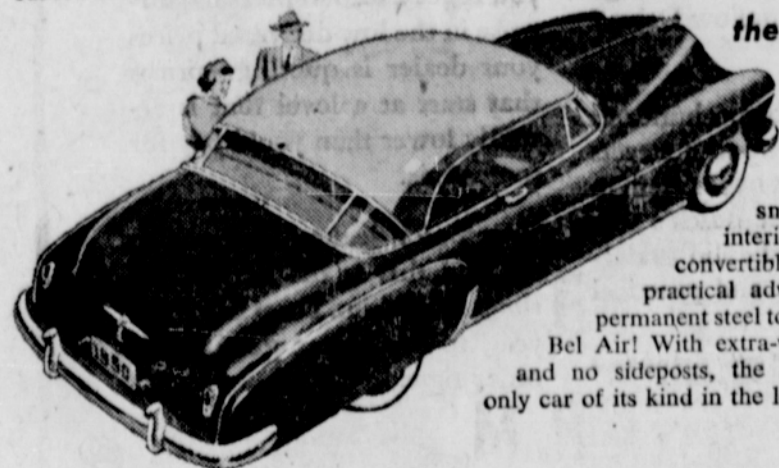
