Approximately 147 relatives and friends called during the afternoon to congratulate the couple and extend well wishes and leave gifts. Mrs. VanNortwick was presented an orchid by her grandchildren.

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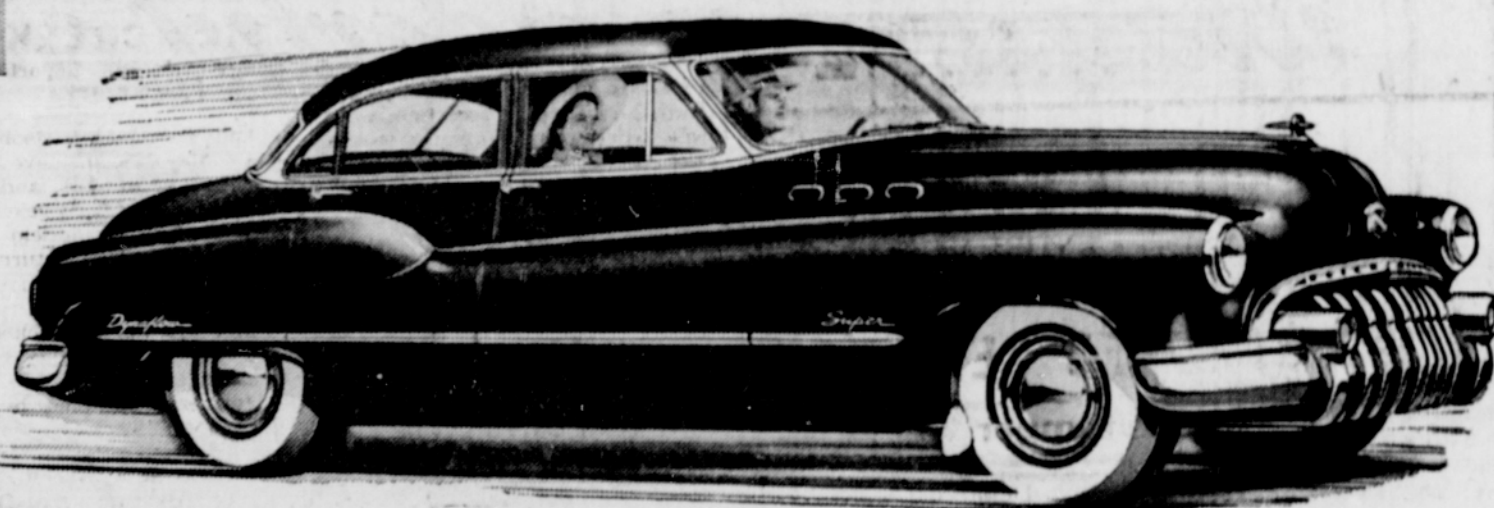
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
