University Hi Bows to Lions' Power, 21 to 7

Bob Dusenberry's Lions strengthened their hold on first place in the Willamette League Thursday night by rambling over University High grid squad at Eugene civic stadium, 21-7.

It was the first time in four years that the local lads had been able to overpower the Uni high gridders. The first half of the game belonged to the Lions, as they scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, and another in the second.

The Tiders finally got rolling after halftime, making their tally in the third frame, but they were too late to make much of a dent in the Grover's lead. They netted a total of 115 yards, but only 21 in the first half.

Outstanding performers for the Lions again were Eddie Tryck and Dick Dobbins, who between them accounted for more than 200 yards gained out of a total of 252. Tryck made all three touchdowns, while Dobbins helped set them up as well as scoring a pair of extra points.

After an exchange of punts following the opening kickoff, the Lions had the ball on the Tide 32. Dobbins dashed around left end for 10, and then Tryck, on a delayed handoff to the weak side, went 22 yards down the sideline for the score. Dobbins ran the ball for the extra point.

Shortly after the kickoff, the Grovers gained possession of the ball, and Dobbins took it to the Tide 41. He picked up 18 yards on a pitchout to place the ball on the 23. Several plays later, Tryck went through left tackle and made the tally.

In the early moments of the second quarter, the Lions made the next score. The running of Dobbins and Tryck was capped by a 36-yard pass from Jim Webb to Ben Hilliker, although it was partially offset by a 15-yard penalty.

With the ball on the 13, Dobbins moved it to the 4, and Tryck made the plunge for the score. Sonny Hayes, who alternated between right half and guard, charged through for the extra tally.

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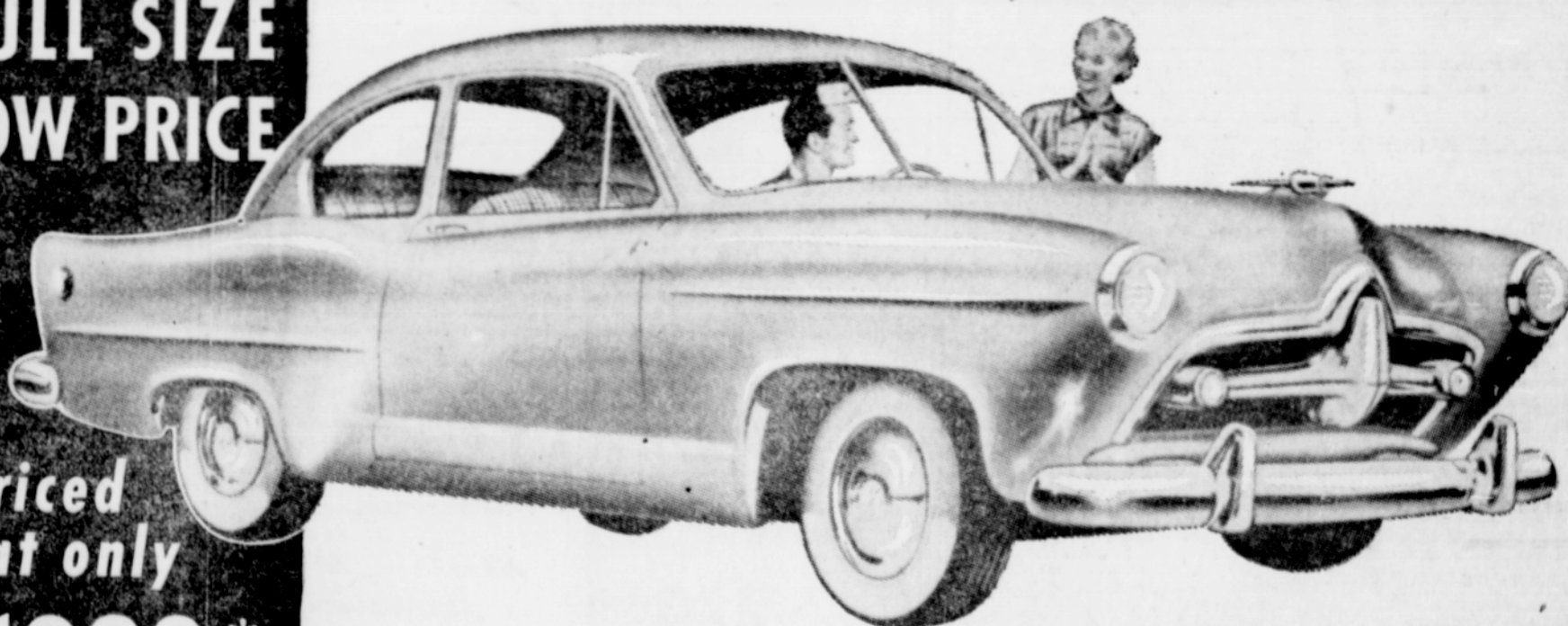
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
