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Lumber Is Given Top Priority in Government List

Recognition of lumber as a key material for all out war and for the present emergency has already been given by government officials.

The lumber industry was included in a list of essential industries by the Department of Commerce in August. The National Production Authority (which now exercises some of the authority of the War Production Board of World War II) has included lumber along with a few metals, rubber, chemicals and textiles in its first control order, NPA 1.

NPA Administrator W. H. Harrison recently summoned lumber leaders from all parts of the United States, including four from the Pacific Northwest, to discuss lumber problems. This was one of a series of meetings, with lumber being preceded only by steel, zinc, copper and aluminum.

"It is gratifying to have lumber recognized as an essential war material," H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, pointed out.

"It was only in the late months of World War II that lumber was finally given similar consideration," Simpson stated, "and then only after the industry had experienced severe shortages of labor, supplies and equipment."

"In the present emergency," he said, "no other industry has been given a preferred position over lumber. This should assure the lumber industry of preferred treatment in getting supplies and equipment, and help logging and lumber firms retain their experienced employees."

Governor's Safety Conference Set For October 25, 26

October 25 and 26 have been named as the dates for The Governor's Regional Safety Conference at Roseburg. Desires of a preliminary local committee of arrangements were consulted and fulfilled in setting the date. This committee represented all segments of local interest.

The region to be covered extends from Eugene to Ashland, and from the coast to the crest of the Cascade mountains. Each separate community or area is expected to send representatives of labor unions, management associations, or delegates from community, fraternal, or service organizations to experience at first hand how accident prevention can be fitted to any community.

A program for the event is soon to be announced.

Preliminary overall arrangements, with places of meeting already fixed, are as follows:

Wednesday, October 25. A dinner meeting to be held in the Roseburg Junior High school will start at 6:30 p.m. A regional safety committee for Roseburg will be appointed and announced there. Because of limited facilities for this meeting, reservations should be made at once through the Accident Prevention Division, Salem.

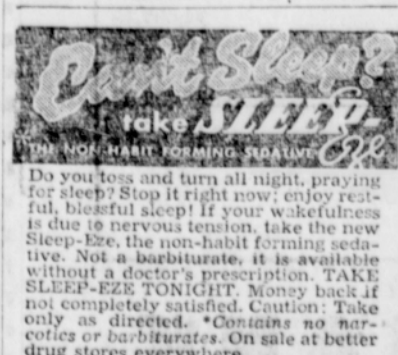
Thursday, October 26. The session from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. will be held in Knights of Pythias Hall, Roseburg.

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Democrats Plan Dinner Saturday

Lane County's Democrats are going to feast their entire slate of candidates for November elections with the assistance of ex-Governor Herbert Maw of Utah as master of ceremonies.

Dr. Jay C. Hicks, chairman of the Lane County Democratic Central Committee, has announced that local democrats are organizing their "largest affair in Lane county democratic history," which will take the form of a dinner at the Anchorage Cafe on Saturday evening, October 14 at 6:30 p.m.

All democratic candidates for office are expected to appear, with major addresses to be given by Austin Flegel, democratic candidate for governor; Dave Shaw, democratic candidate for congress; Howard Latourette, democratic candidate for the senate; and Howard Morgan, the democrats' choice for commissioner of labor.

Local candidates, according to the chairman, will be called upon for a few remarks about their own campaigns for state and county positions.

Meeting to Discuss Liquor Advertising Ban Set for Oct. 23

The Ministerial Association and the Christian Laymen's League will sponsor a union meeting to discuss the initiative measure on the ballot regarding promulgated alcoholic beverages.

The meeting will be held at the First Methodist Church at 7:30 p.m. Monday, October 23.

Rev. Sherwood Smith and Ernest L. Clark, chairmen of these respective groups, made the joint announcement of the meeting which will include all of the city and the Christian laymen.

Harold D. Wilson from the Oregon Temperance League will be present to present plans and actions for promotion of the bill which is not prohibition, but which will stop glamorous promotional liquor advertising.

The churches of Oregon united in the Oregon Council of Churches are together promoting this initiative measure.

State Death Toll Continues to Rise

Oregon traffic accidents killed 40 persons last month to bring the state's death toll for the first nine months of the year to 290, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry reported Friday.

The death count was 237 last year at the same time.

Most of the upsurge came during the heavy travel of July and August as well as last month, Newbry said, with 149 lives lost in those three months alone. Thirty five of the September fatalities resulted from accidents taking place on rural roads and highways, as against five in the cities.

Worst single month on record for Oregon was December of 1946, when 56 deaths were reported. Newbry warned that late fall and early winter consistently are periods of critical traffic danger, with storm conditions and early darkness combining to intensify normal hazards. Heaviest pedestrian loss of life usually takes place in those seasons, the secretary added.

John Tarr Enters Chiropractic School
