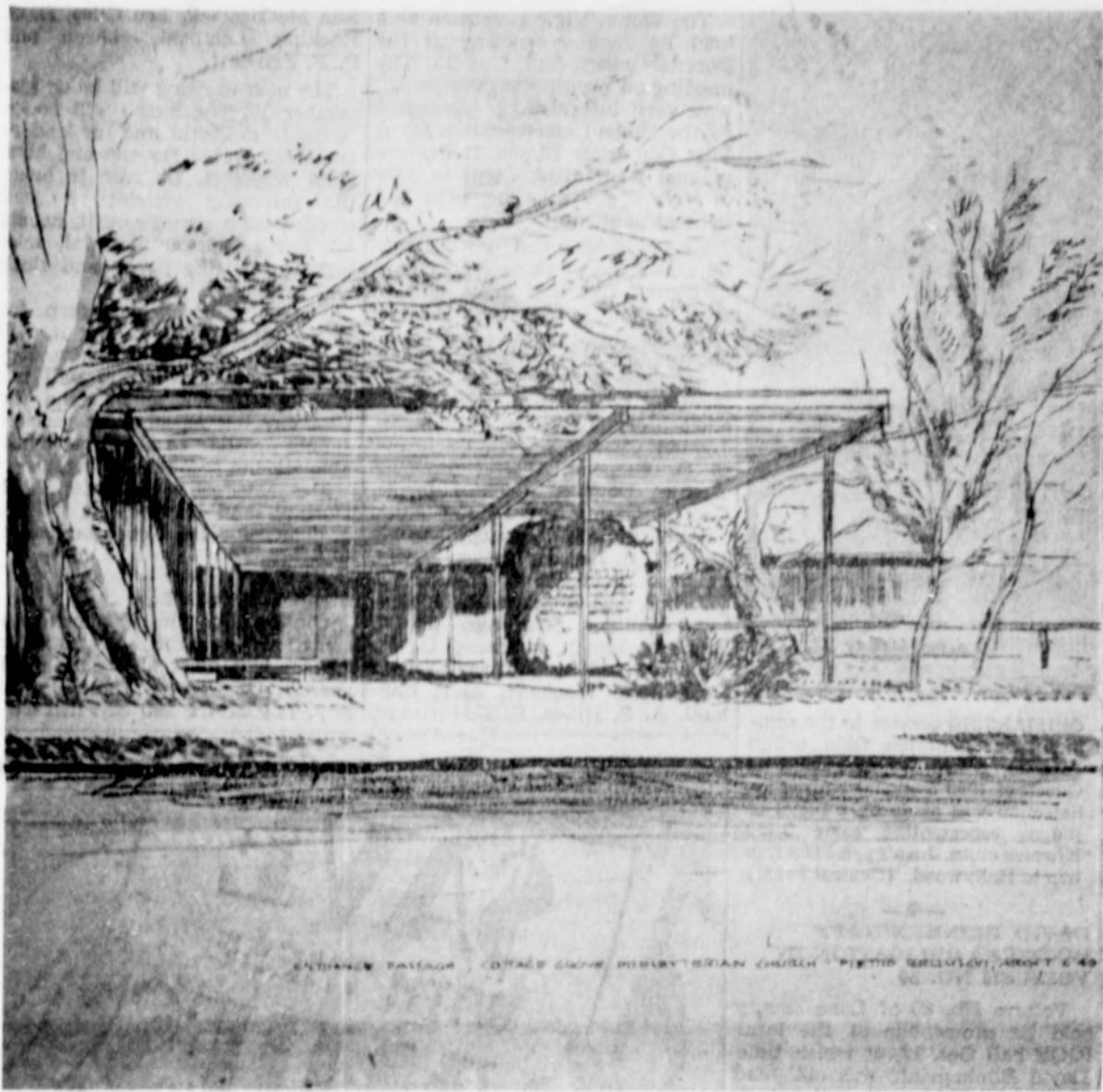


Presbyterians Begin Work on New Church



The new Presbyterian church, the entrance of which is shown in the above drawing, is now under construction near the intersection of Third and Adams streets.

This covered entrance passage, depicted through the courtyard from Adams street, is marked by a large boulder with an inscription inviting the passersby to come inside and worship. The landscaped courtyard provides a zone of quiet to change the churchgoer's attitude from that of the street to that of the worshiper.

The nave runs parallel to the courtyard, and large clear glass windows make the courtyard seem to be part of the interior. Seating space for approximately 200 persons will be provided in the nave, with provision for an overflow crowd on special days.

The building will be constructed in an L-shape, and will include a large Fellowship hall, kitchen, parlor, pastor's study, five large Sunday school rooms, and a robe-

ing room for the choir. In addition, the church will have a small chapel which will be left open at all times for prayer and meditation.

The bell from the old church, which is nearly 60 years old, will be placed in a campanile in the courtyard made of two sturdy carved cedar posts. Most of the roofing will be flat, but over the nave the roof will curve upward, bringing the exterior appearance to a climax over the chancel with a rugged wooden cross.

Panel type heating placed in the concrete slab will keep the one-story building comfortable during cool weather. Exterior boards and batten will be stained a warm brown. A large stained glass window will let the natural light into the chancel, where a huge copper cross will be suspended over the communion table.

"An attempt has been made," Rev. D. Hugh Peniston, pastor of the church, said this week, "to de-

sign a church which will be suitable for the residential area of a small community, preserving the atmosphere of friendliness and intimacy of a congregation which is not too large for people to know one another.

"Being constructed largely of wood," he continued, "it will stand as a symbol of the faith of the people in terms of the materials which are familiar to the community, and which are the source of its economic life."

Architect of the new Presbyterian church is Pietro Belluschi of Portland, winner of the International Prize in Architecture for 1950. He has recently been appointed dean of the school of architecture at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

SP Isn't Telling The Whole Story, Lumberman Claims

"The Southern Pacific is telling only half the story of the freight car shortage," H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association charged here today.

"In a recent advertisement published in many Oregon newspapers," Simpson stated, "the Southern Pacific says that 21,000 new cars have been put in service in the five years since the war, but fails to state that they have retired approximately 17,000 old-age cars during that period."

"W. W. Hale, vice president of the Southern Pacific, who signed this advertisement," the lumber leader declared, "has stated that the increase in number of cars owned by the Southern Pacific is 3%. He fails to point out that the increase in traffic on this line, in the past ten years according to Interstate Commerce Commission reports, has varied from 45% to as high as 83% a year in that period."

Simpson said the advertisement also states that the freight car shortage is national, but fails to mention that the shortage on Southern Pacific is far more acute than on the lines of any other carrier.

He said increased buying by consumers, increased production for national defense, increased military movements to Korea, movement of grain, labor controversies, and the 5-day week mentioned in the advertisement have affected all railroads, but only the Southern Pacific has failed so miserably to supply service.

Admittedly the demand for lumber has exceeded previous years, Simpson agreed, but this same demand affected the 75% of national lumber production not on the Southern Pacific, which received reasonably adequate service, as well as the 25% on the Southern Pacific, which received thoroughly inadequate service.

The cooperation asked by the Southern Pacific in their advertisement, Simpson pointed out, has been generously extended by Oregon shippers, but cooperation will not create cars that do not exist.

"There can be only one conclusion," the lumber leader said flatly, "and that is the Southern Pacific does not have adequate equipment to properly service the industries on its lines."

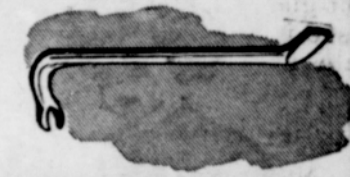

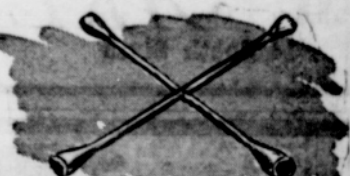

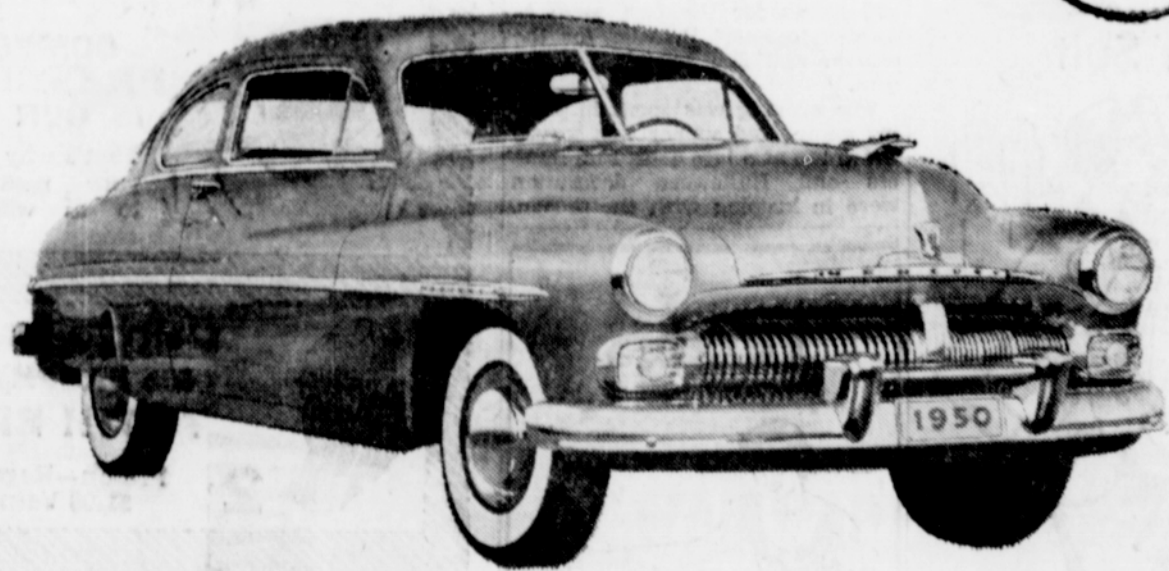
