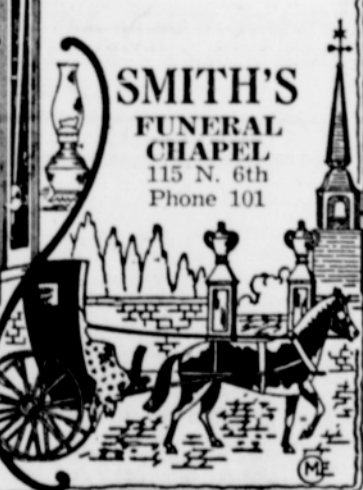
CLUB WILL OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY OCTOBER 26

Pedestrian Gets Blame for Many Traffic Fatalities

More than one half of Oregon's pedestrian death victims during the first six months of 1950 literally asked to be killed, according to the state traffic safety division, Salem.

There was a pedestrian violation or unsafe action in 55 per cent of the pedestrian fatalities, the division pointed out. Further, nineteen of the 29 pedestrians who died in the January through June period were killed while crossing outside of crosswalks. Not one pedestrian death occurred while walking inside a marked crosswalk.

Further evidence that dark clothing is an invitation to death was shown in that 62 per cent of the pedestrian deaths occurred when the victim was wearing dark clothes. This, the division said, should be ample warning to pedestrians to dress in colored or white clothes when walking, particularly after dark.

These next few months, the division concluded, are particularly hazardous months for pedestrians as darkness comes while many are still walking home from work or shopping.

Fruit Men Need Modern Methods

"Fruit well grown is half sold" is a good old adage but in these modern times it is not enough, declares an Oregon State college extension horticulture specialist.

C. O. Rawlings says fruit growers are having to devote more and more of their time to marketing. Some old fruit varieties, just like out-dated model cars, are going out of style.

With increased competition among fruits for the buyer's dollar, apple growers, for example, must pay more and more attention to what the market demands. This includes paying some heed to the manner in which the product is handled from the time it leaves the orchard to how it appears in the retail store.

At least part of the buyer resistance to apples is caused by rough handling, the specialist states. Try dropping a box of apples, he says, then allow it to stand for a week. Peeling the apples a week later will show the number of bruises caused by the rough handling. With long distances to eastern markets, a good many bruises are visible before apples are sold at retail.

Bruised apples caused by rough handling do not make for "repeat" sales, the specialist adds.

Generally speaking, this is what the apple market is now demanding, according to Rawlings: red apples—bright red with what is known as "finish." Richard is usually good; Starking is usually too dark. He says outlets for yellow apples are on the decline. Other characteristics required are good size, crispness, flavor, long storage season, multiple use, freedom of core breakdown, freedom from insect and disease blemishes, and absence of shipping and handling bruises.

Even though saleable, an apple must generally be considered a "grower apple"—cheap to produce—to be acceptable. Early bearing, regular bearing of good sized fruit, high yields, and resistance to pests and unfavorable climate are a few of the qualities which make "grower's apples."

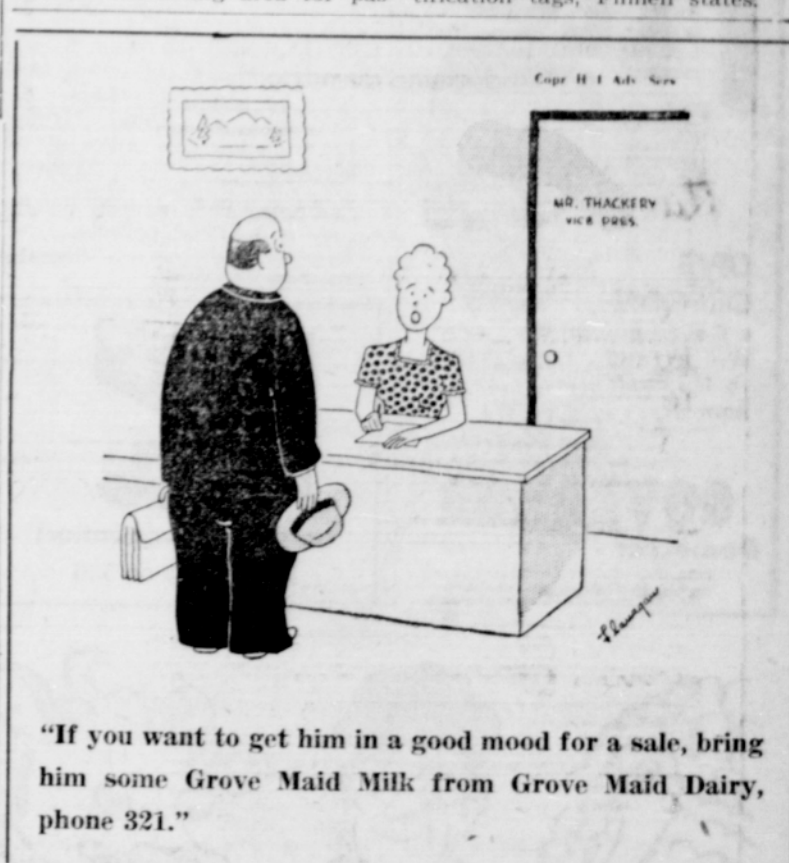
Red Clover Seed Has New Uniform Certified Names

Farmers expecting to plant certified red clover next spring for further certification can save themselves some money by careful buying.

In a move to standardize names used in certifying three varieties of red clover—Midland, Kenland and Cumberland—seeds for sale this fall in the western states will have uniform tag names, states H. E. Finnell, Oregon State college seed certification specialist.

"Foundation" and "registered" seed is eligible for further certification, the specialist states. Tags indicating the seed is merely "certified" means the seed is no longer eligible for replanting with certification in view. This latter type seed normally goes into commercial channels for planting through the marketing area for pasture and hay use.

The new uniform names, "foundation, registered," and "certified" will be plainly marked on all certification tags, Finnell states.
