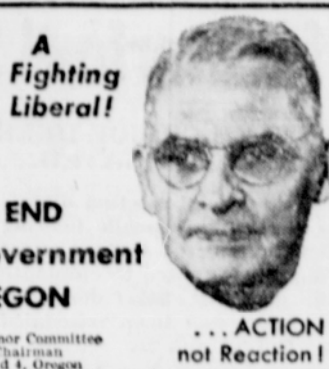
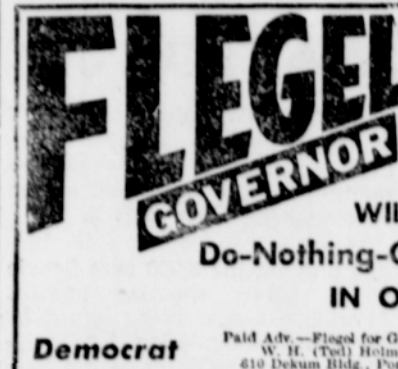

Funeral services were held Saturday, Oct. 14, at 2 p.m., for Miss Flora MacDonald at Smith's Funeral Chapel. Burial was in Rest Haven Memorial Park, Eugene. The Rev. Harold Carpenter of Vancouver, Wash., officiated.

Miss MacDonald, age 80, passed away at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Z. A. Coop, 1037 Madison street, on Thursday, Oct. 12. She was born in Rutherford county, N. C., February 15, 1870, and when a young lady moved to Colorado and then to Fort Washaka, Wyoming, where she was assistant matron of the Indian Territory. She later moved to California and then to the state of Washington, coming to Cottage Grove in 1943. Miss MacDonald was a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. She had no close survivors.

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
