## Graduate Students Increase at UO

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Special)—A seven per cent increase in enrollment in the University of Oregon's graduate school for fall term points up the growing stature of this basic university strength.

Enrollment totalled 622 at the end of the third week of the fall term, according to Clifford L. Constance, registrar. Total enrollment in the University for fall is 3,141.

Men still outnumber women on the campus by about two to one. Male enrollment now totals 3,469, women 1,633. Students new in the university are 1,816, with returning students totaling 3,286.

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
