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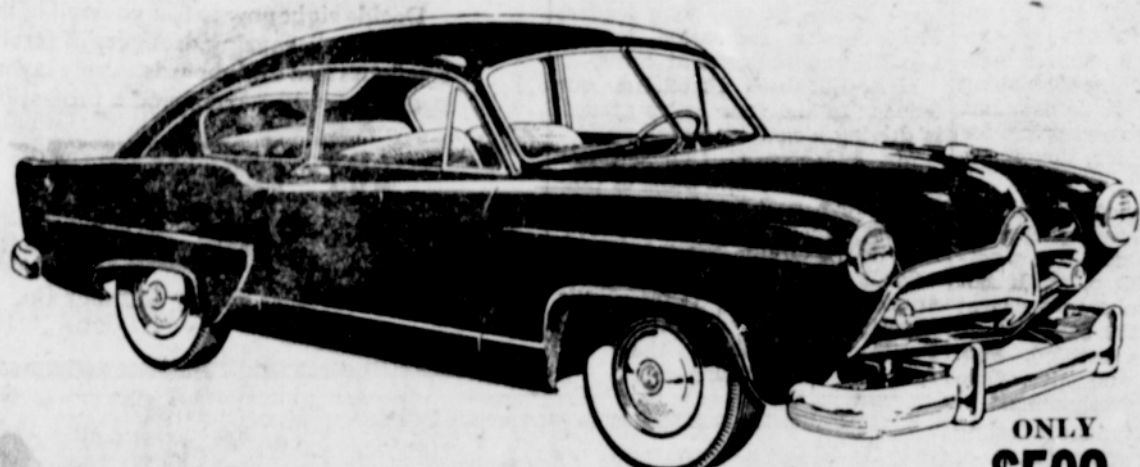
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News of Scouting

Oregon Youngsters Receive Awards for Forest Fire Help

SALEM, Oct. 26 (Special)—Fifty-one Oregon boys and girls have been cited by the Keep Oregon Green Association for outstanding efforts during the past summer in reducing man-caused forest fires.

Each boy and girl singled out for special honors has been awarded a special "Service Under Fire" badge, and a copy of the book recently published on "Trees to Know in Oregon," according to Albert Wiesendanger, executive secretary of K.O.G.

Marion county had 9 winners to lead the list and Clackamas, Douglas, and Jackson, each with 6 winners, were the second highest counties. Thirteen Oregon counties had boys and girls who qualified for the highest honor in fire prevention.

All of the 51 winners are members of the Oregon Green Guards, the youth activity of Keep Oregon Green, which now includes more than 34,000 Oregon boys and girls. Membership rolls are open to any boy and girl in Oregon between the ages of 8 and 16 years, who will send his name and address to the Salem headquarters of K.O.G. There are no membership dues.

Awards are made each year by the Keep Oregon Green Association to boys and girls who have done outstanding service to their state in fire prevention beyond the usual call of duty. In most cases the youthful citizens reported grass, brush, and forest fires. In some cases they actually fought the fires. The alertness of these youngsters has been of tremendous help. Wiesendanger explained, for fires caught before they have a chance to spread, are easy to put out.

State Traffic Death Rate Increase Is Highest on Coast

Traffic deaths on Oregon streets and highways are increasing at a rate far above the average increase reported by the rest of the nation, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry revealed today.

The state's death toll in the first eight months of 1950 jumped 29 per cent over the number killed during the same period last year. Average increase for all other states was 11 per cent.

Highest on the Pacific coast, Oregon's per cent of increase was equalled or surpassed by only eight other states, Newberry said. California showed a 2 per cent gain, while Washington traffic fatalities climbed 8 per cent.

For Oregon, worst months of the year thus far were July and August, when a total of 106 persons were killed, the secretary reported. He warned that the remaining months with early darkness and slippery road surfaces adding to the usual dangers, may match or exceed the mid-summer toll.

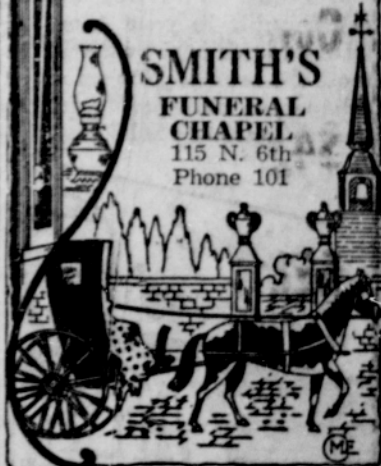

Broadcast: October 23, 1950

1/4 cup sifted, all-

purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking

powder

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup fat milk

2 teaspoon vanilla

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow

(350°). Grease well then dust with

flour a baking pan 8 x 8 x 2 in. deep.

Sift flour with baking powder, salt

and cinnamon. Have apples and nuts

ready. Beat egg until very light. Beat

in sugar, about 1/4 cup at a time. Beat

in milk and vanilla. Add flour mixture

all at once. Beat vigorously 1

minute. Fold in apples and nuts. Pour

into prepared pan. Bake 35 min., or

until cake pulls from sides of pan.

Turn out and cool. Makes 4 servings.
