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## OSC Gridders Try Again; Hope for Win Over Montana

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis.—An embattled Oregon State football team, loser of four straight games to top-ranking clubs of the nation, will go all out to snare its first victory of the season when it plays host to the dangerous University of Montana Grizzlies on Bell field Saturday afternoon.

The task of recording an initial win at the expense of Montana will not be an easy one. Coach Ted Shipkey's Grizzlies have won three out of five starts to date, including an upset victory over Idaho, and dropped two hard-fought, one-touchdown decisions to Oregon and Washington State.

Star of the Montana team is Quarterback Tommy Kingsford, one of the best passers in the nation. He connected on 55 out of 114 aerials last season and gave the Beavers all kinds of trouble. His chief target has been Ray Baker, three-year letterman and who caught 31 passes for 455 yards and five touchdowns last season.

Kip Taylor's Beavers battled all the way in losing to defending champion California 27-0 at Berkeley last Saturday. The game was much closer than the score would indicate, with the Bears' final score coming in the last 15 seconds. California held a slim 6-0 lead at the half and took advantage of a couple of OSC mistakes to build up the margin in the second half.

Oregon State came through the California game without serious injury and should be at full strength for Montana. Jim Clark, ace right guard who missed the California contest because of a bad case of hives, probably will be fully recovered by Saturday.

Gene Morrow, ace Orange quarterback, should be back in top shape for the Grizzlies. Despite the fact that he had only worked out twice since injuring his eye in the Stanford game, the accurate passing junior from The Dalles connected on nine out of 14 passes against the Bears for 99 yards. Sophomore Fullback Sam Baker also had a good day against California, running 69 yards in 22 tries.

Players who tome the farthest distance for collegiate football at Oregon State are Hogan Garrison, Jim Luster and John Misuraca, rook stars from Gloucester, Mass. And Art Charette and Dave Porin hall from New Jersey.
