

Publisher Speaks To High School Press Conference

Walter W. R. May, president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association, spoke on "What Journalism Means to You" at the opening convocation of the High School Press Conference in Eugene Saturday, Dr. Paul S. Dull, of the University of Oregon political science department discussed "What Korea Means to You."

May, co-publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise-Courier, told 500 high school journalists and their advisors that "journalism is a stepping stone to almost every activity today."

The "mental urgency" required of all good journalists can give one an advantage over others in understanding the problems of our world today.

Korea and its implications has a special significance for every individual who seeks peace and security in the world today, indicated Dr. Dull. His suggestion for western world was an organization—within or without the United Nations—granting no veto power and with a police group strong enough to put down any aggression wherever it might occur.

A press conference was conducted by Dick Williams, director of the Erb Memorial building at the close of the lunch hour. One representative from each school attending had the opportunity of addressing questions to the director relative to his work and to the construction and use of the building.

Kathryn Clark represented Cottage Grove and wrote an interview-type story covering the event. Her story will be sent to the Oregon Scholastic Press Assn. for judging in competition with other entries.

Others attending from Cottage Grove were Anne Hill, Willis Johnson, Thelma McDonald, Charlene Mathews, Ben Hilliker and Miss Jule Crume, advisor.

What Other Papers Say

Oregon is the only state issuing a voters' pamphlet containing statements and pictures of candidates. Twenty-three states issue pamphlets explaining measures. Sixty-seven tons of paper and two barrels of ink were used in producing the pamphlets—enough ink to paint the statehouse black. Postage cost \$13,500. The total expense of producing and distributing the pamphlets for the Nov. 7 general election was approximately \$90,000. Candidates and opponents of the measures supply only about 8% of the expense. The state charges \$50 a page for statements by candidates and matter concerning ballot measures. Legislative candidates are required to pay only \$10 a page as their statements appear in pamphlets distributed only in their county. Bills repealing the law providing for voters' pamphlets have appeared at several sessions of the legislature but always enough members have believed the expense of the pamphlets is a worthy investment in good government. In previous years about 7% of the pamphlets were returned because the persons to whom they were addressed had moved without leaving a forwarding address. This year the elections division refused to guarantee return postage.—Murray Wade's "Capital Parade."

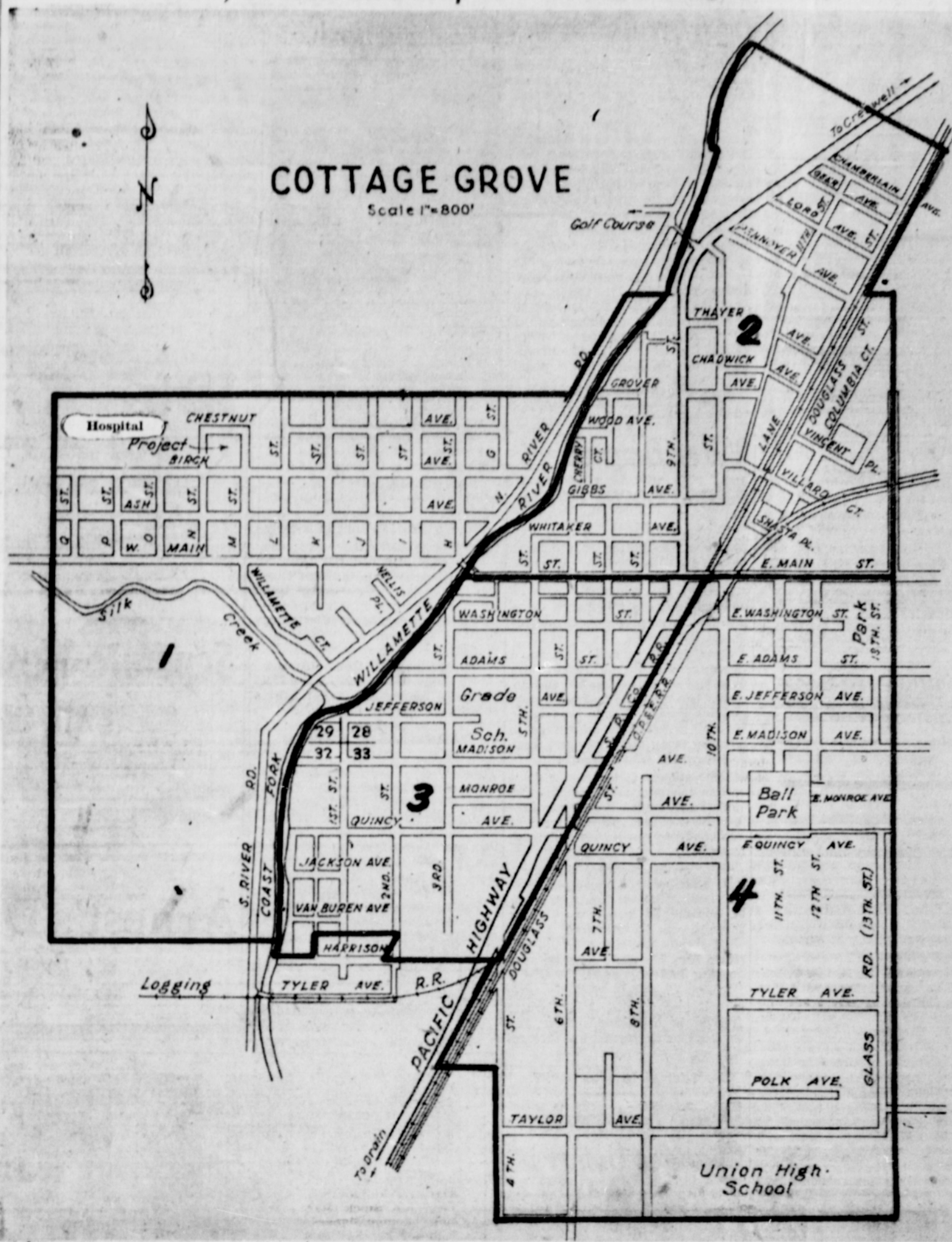
London Resident Dies October 31

Union Dedication To Be Feature of UO Homecoming

University of Oregon, Eugene, (Special)—A ceremony of religious consecration, in which representatives of the three major religious faiths will participate, will formally open the dedication events for the University of Oregon's new Erb Memorial Union Friday afternoon.

Sponsored by the University Religious Council under the direction of Irene Philan, Portland, the consecration ceremony will be held at the main entrance of the new student union at 5 p.m. Officiating at the ceremony will be Paul Wexler of Portland. Speakers are Father Leo Linhan of the Catholic faith, Eugene; Rabbi E. Charles Sydney of the Jewish faith, Portland; and the Rev. Wesley G. Nicholson of the Protestant faith, Eugene.

Inspection of the Union by state officials will be an event of early Friday afternoon. Leading this party will be Governor Douglas McKay and Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, chairman of the building committee of the state board of higher education.

The dedication ceremony will be at 8:15 Friday evening the ballroom of the student union. A preliminary ceremony will be held with a ceremony to be broadcast at 8:30 p.m. over Eugene stations.

On the program for the dedication will be Governor McKay representing the state of Oregon; Dr. Kleinsorge, representing the state board of higher education; Dr. H. K. Newburn, president of the University, will represent the University administration; John McGregor of New York and a graduate of the University in 1923, will represent the alumni; and Barry Mountain of Portland will represent the students.

Music for the ceremony will be by the University Singers, under the direction of Donald M. Allton, assistant professor of organ and music theory. Open house for all who are interested will be held in the Erb Memorial Union starting at 9 o'clock Friday night.

The student union will be the center of activities during Homecoming Weekend, of which the dedication is a part. Most events of the week end will be held in the \$2,100,000 structure.

Community Chest Drive Explained

County quota for this year, which encompasses 29 different agencies, is \$159,146, the biggest sum ever set for Lane county to raise.

The drive is scheduled to end Nov. 8. Schaefer said he hopes that Cottage Grove's part in the campaign will be completed before this deadline.

Top reason for the increase in the Chest budget this year is the increased cost of operating the agencies that participate in the Community Chest, according to C. P. Tillman, general chairman of the 1951 appeal. This increase was approved by the Chest after careful study of the work of the agencies.

Another reason for the growth is the additional burden placed on the agencies by a growing population. The Boy Scouts increased their membership in Lane county by 37 percent in 1950, the Girl Scouts grew nine percent, and programs of the YMCA and YWCA were expanded, to mention only four of the 29 agencies.

Also, another agency was added to the Chest this year. The Associated Service of the Armed Forces, formerly the USO, was included, since the armed forces are being rebuilt so tremendously.

Oct. 24 was officially declared Red Feather Day in Lane county by Governor Douglas McKay who said, "All of us realize the wonderful work the Community Chest agencies do in helping those who are unfortunate enough to be temporarily in distress."

Speaker Calls Public Housing Plan Socialism

The question of whether Lane county shall have public housing may emerge as an important issue during the last minute round-up of campaign issues prior to the election.

Speaking against the measure which would authorize the county court to enter into a cooperative agreement with the housing authority of Lane county for development of the so called low rent public housing, Don Good of Eugene blasted the measure as socialistic before the Cottage Grove Lions club Thursday.

Good said the issue had been overwhelmingly rejected in most communities where the issue was put to a popular vote. He defended private enterprise in the construction of needed housing and said in all history the government never has been able to do anything as economically as the individual. Admitting the need of the disabled veterans, he said government aid should come in the form of higher pensions rather than low cost housing to help the veteran with a fixed income.

In 1949 private enterprise built 900,000 housing units at a cost per unit below the federal estimate, according to Good. Ten million housing units were constructed in the ten year period from 1940 to 1950.

The advocates of public housing, he said, cite the success of the public schools as one of the reasons for public housing, but he reminded his listeners that the public schools are operated by local men who know local problems.

"In 1860 a great emancipator freed the negro from paternalism and at the same time the government brought the Indian under paternalism, trying to educate and protect him. And look what has happened to the Indian in the intervening years."

Preliminary to the talk of Mr. Good, Jimmy Grewelle, a high school student, favored the club and guests with two vocal solos. Miss Ann Hill, another high school student, accompanied him on the piano.
