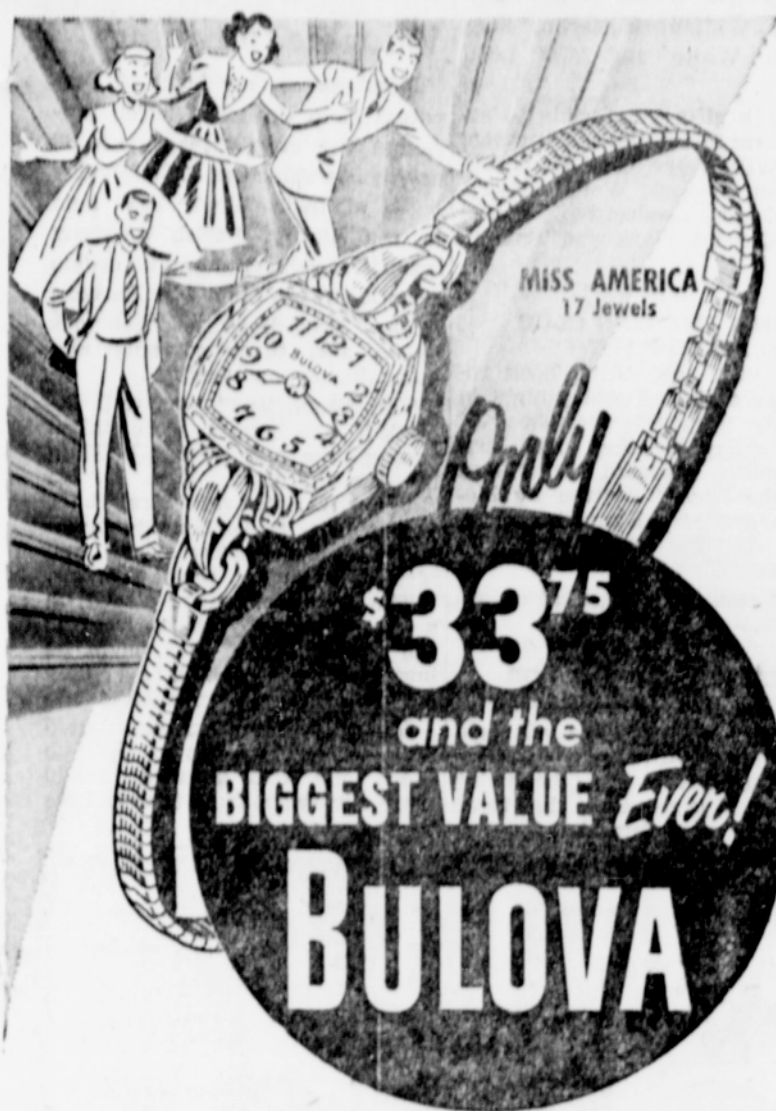
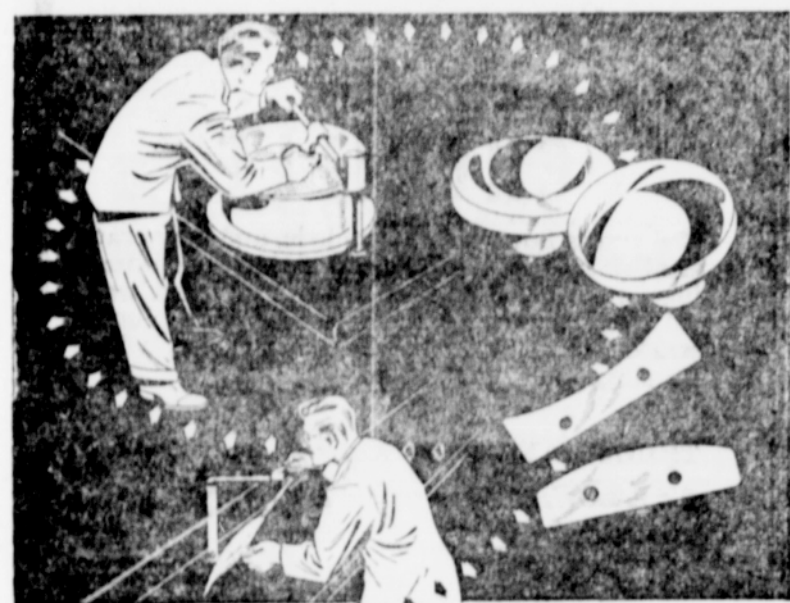




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Lions Conclude Season With 25-6 Victory Over Springfield

In a game studied with all the thrills of modern-day football, the Cottage Grove Lions humbled the Springfield Millers Friday night, 25-6, to close the season in a blaze of glory.

It marked the fifth victory for the Lions, combined with a tie with Roseburg and a defeat at the hands of Eugene, made for the most successful season since 1948. The Groves were undefeated in Willamette League competition.

Friday's game was one of the most exciting from the local standpoint that has been played on Curran field. Highlight of the contest occurred with 39 seconds of play remaining and the Lions in possession of the ball on their own 6-yard line.

Quarterback Jim Webb received the ball from center, faked a hand-off, and took off thru the entire Springfield squad. He didn't stop

until he had crossed the Miller goal line, a run of 94 yards. At the beginning of the sprint, it looked as though he might be stopped, but he shook off all would-be tacklers, and was all alone except for his interference after hitting the 30-yard line.

Local fans also were treated to the usual fine performances of Dick Dobbins and Eddie Tryk, who were both playing in their final grid contests for CGUHS. Tryk lived up to his title of leading scorer for the Willamette league by hitting pay dirt twice Friday night.

He scored both tallies early in the fourth quarter, which started with the ball in possession of the Lions on the Miller's 10-yard line.

Four power plays brought the ball to the 6-inch line, no further, and the Millers took over. After moving out to the 5-yard line, George Bilderback tried to get out in the open with a pass. But Lowry Hoyer, Lion tackle, intercepted on the 17 and got as far as the 8 before he was brought down.

Dobbins charged through to the 4, and then Tryk went over for the score. Wes Malcolm's kick for the extra point was wide.

Four plays later, the Lions took over again on the Miller 44. Again Dobbins and Tryk combined running talents and covered the remaining distance with the aid of good line blocking in six plays. This time Malcolm's kick was good, and the score stood at 19-6.

Sonny Hayes was first to have an influence on the scoreboard after only seven minutes of play. It was the climax of a 94-yard drive, most of which was due to a 52-yard dash by Dobbins from his own 43.

Springfield's lone tally came late in the third quarter when Carl Bour plunged over to cap a passing-and-running attack which started on the Groves 48. It was during this drive that Derald Jenkins, ace Miller fullback who was the main spark of the team, was sidelined with a wrenched leg and had to be carried from the field.

Statistics showed an even greater Lion supremacy than the score indicated. In total net yardage, the home team racked up an impressive 356 yards, while the Millers came through with 95. The Groves also excelled in first downs, 19 to 7.



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CG Recreation Tops Lady Bowlers

Cottage Grove Recreation maintained top position in the Women's bowling league at the close of the third week of competition with a record of eight wins and one loss. In contests last week, CG Gas Co. shut out Webb's Hardware, 3-0, as Betty Hurley rolled a 158 to make the top score for a single frame, and Betty Bone was high for the series with 412.

Other 3-0 shutouts were chalked up by Con's over Women of the Moose, and Short's Grocery over Knickerbocker's. In the first contest, Elta Moore was high in both individual and series, 177-441, while in the other competition, Margaret Spriggs and Mary Arne shared honors. Both rolled 172 for one frame, but Mrs. Spriggs was high for the series with 447.

CG Recreation edged past Daugherty Lumber Co. bowlers with a 2-1 decision. Tana Rippey of Daugherty's, however, made the top scores of 175-456.

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Prospects Poor for Special Elk Season in Clatsop County

Hunters checked 198 deer out of the Silverton hills area east of Silverton and 136 deer out of the Burnt river country north of Baker during the recent three-day special hunts held in both areas.

The 800 permit season was for bucks or does and the 300 permit Burnt river hunt was for antlerless deer. Deer residing on farm lands and causing extensive crop damage were the object of these special hunts. A third special deer hunt will be held in the White river area of northern Wasco county in December.

Elk hunters planning to participate in the extended elk season for cow or bull elk in Clatsop county can expect low success, says the game commission. Elk are not numerous in the foothills bordering the farm lands. The object of this hunt, states the commission, is to eliminate and haze elk from farm lands as they drift down to the valleys in December. All areas within one mile of current established cultivated lands are open for the extended Clatsop county elk season.

Washington State Is Next Foe for OSC Saturday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—What will happen when two teams led by ex-coaching partners who teach the same basic system collide on the gridiron?

The answer to that \$64 question will be learned Saturday afternoon at Pullman where traditional rivals Washington State and Oregon State meet in a Pacific Coast conference football game that promises all kinds of fireworks.

Just two years ago WSC's new grid boss, Forest Evashevski, and the Beavers' Kip Taylor were members of Biggie Munn's coaching staff at Michigan State. Evashevski handled the backs and Taylor taught the ends. In the spring of 1949 Taylor came west to take over the top job at OSC. A year later Evashevski accepted the Cougar position. Both mentors are Michigan graduates and teach the Wolverine version of the single wing.

This personal duel only heaps fuel on one of the hottest and closest rivalries on the Pacific slope. The arch state college rivals have met on the gridiron 38 times and are exactly where they were at the start—even. Each club has won 18 and only two of the contests have ended in ties.

Funk Wins Turkey In Golf Tourney

Ray Funk of Cottage Grove was winner of a turkey Sunday as he took top honors in the men's handicap match of the turkey tournament held at the Cottage Grove Golf course. Funk had a score of 76.

The championship flight, composed entirely of Eugene golfers, was taken by George Lynch of Laurelwood with an 81. Runner-up was Ralph Hope Jr. of Oakway with 82.

In the women's division, the turkey was won by Dolly Omlid with second place going to Mary Wright. Both are from Eugene.

Anlauf Man Wins Salmon Derby Prize

Ralph Marvick of Anlauf was winner of the weekly prize for the Salmon Derby held at Lakeside for the week ending Nov. 11.

These prizes are awarded on a hidden weight system with the different weights for each week sealed to each respective prize. The winning weight for the week ending Nov. 11 was 12 pounds 4 ounces, which was also the weight of Marvick's salmon. Two other anglers recorded identical weights but Marvick won by a flip of the coin.

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Boxers Set for Match in Portland

Portland, (Special)—The National Boxing club, in keeping with its tradition of fine fights this winter, comes up with Rusty Payne of San Diego and Billy Smith of Oakland in the main event on its next card.

The ten-round headliner is scheduled here at the Civic Auditorium on Tuesday night, November 21. Popular prices will prevail.

Payne, who is now living in Portland, has made a big hit here. Last spring he defeated Joe Kahut and last month he dropped a close decision to Willie Bean.

Smith is one of the most prominent fighters in the game and a leading aspirant for the light-heavyweight championship. He's acquitted himself nobly against such fighters as Ezzard Charles, Jimmy Blinn and Archie Moore. He's still on the way up.

Both of these fighters are good punchers and it's doubtful if the bout will go the distance. It's possible that the winner will be paired against Bean on December 5 for the Pacific Coast heavy-weight championship.

The Portland Boxing Commission has withdrawn its recognition of Joe Kahut since his retirement and the Washington and California ring bodies recognize Bean as title-holder. The local commission will sanction a match between Bean and the winner for the crown.

Mountain Goats Thrive in Wallows

Three of Oregon's first mountain goat citizens have again been sighted in their new Wallowa mountain home by game commission field agent, Ted Laughlin. The elusive goats have been seen once since six of them were trapped in northern Washington and released in the Wallows last March.

Laughlin sighted the three mountain goats on a high peak near Wallowa lake. They were at such a distance that he could not make out whether the lone nanny in the group had become a mother. The other nanny died shortly after the animals were released. The game commission plans to trap more goats in northern Washington this winter in cooperation with the Washington game department.

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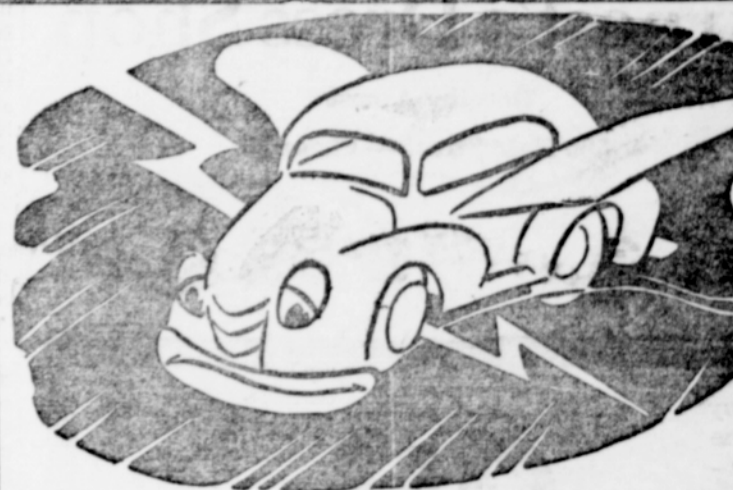
