**RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Pumpkin Pie

Broadcast: November 18, 1950

1/2 cup brown sugar 1 1/2 cups cooked or canned pumpkin
1 tablespoon flour 1/2 cup egg
1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup finely beaten egg
2 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice 2 tablespoons dark molasses

Turn on oven; set at very hot (450°). Mix brown sugar, flour, salt and the spice. Add rest of ingredients and stir until smooth. Pour into deep 9-in. pie pan lined with unbaked pastry made with pie crust mix. Bake 15 min., then reduce heat to slow (325°) and bake about 40 min., or until firm.

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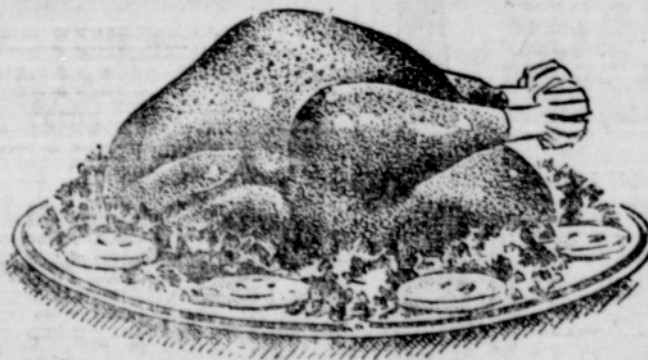
