Trash Fish Wiped Out in Reservoirs

Fern Ridge and Cottage Grove reservoirs have been treated with a powerful fish toxin, rotenone, by game commission fishery agents, who report that all carp and suckers in the two reservoirs are now turning to fertilizer.

Game fish in both reservoirs have been unable to hold their own in competition with the prolific trash fish. Now that the trash fish have been destroyed, the fishery men foresee good angling at the reservoirs in years to come. Next spring the game commission will stock the reservoir waters with largemouth bass, bluegill, and croppie.

The army engineers aided in the two-day trash fish elimination campaign by drawing down the reservoirs to concentrate the fish in a small area. Fern Ridge was lowered to the old Long Tom river channel, and Cottage Grove reservoir was drawn down to 800 acre feet of water.

Screens at Rogue River Dam to Keep Fish from Turbines

The Grants Pass irrigation district was informed Wednesday, November 15, by the Oregon state game commission that it was to comply with the law and install adequate screening at the turbine and pumping system, intake of the Savage Rapids dam on the Rogue river.

Screening plans drawn up by game commission engineers were also given to the irrigation district. The engineering department at Oregon state college aided in the screening plans. The game commission feels that the development of travelling water screens has removed the last obstacle to screening the intake.

In a letter to the irrigation district State Game Director Charles Lockwood stated, "there is no question of the damage the turbines have been doing for more than thirty years to the immensely valuable Rogue river salmon, steelhead, and resident trout fisheries. Reproduction to the communities heavily dependent on sport fishing, to sportsmen, who spend millions of dollars annually in the area, and to the commercial fishermen, who take salmon in the offshore troll can only come through your earnest effort in installation of screens."

Studies by commission fishery agents indicate that Savage Rapids dam turbines pumped a minimum of 210,000 young steelhead and salmon through Grants Pass irrigation district ditches in one year. A large percentage of the fish passing through the turbines were also killed.

Portland C of C Sponsors Sawmill Power Experiment

Oregon State College—The Oregon Forest Products laboratory, located on the Oregon State college campus, will undertake a research project designed to make possible the utilization of wood wastes in generating power for sawmills as the result of a \$2000 grant from the Portland Chamber of Commerce, P. B. Proctor, managing director of the laboratory, has announced.

George H. Atherton, a laboratory mechanical engineer who conceived the idea, is constructing a pilot plant to determine the industrial feasibility of the process that would eventually result, if experiments are successful, in the design of a compact, light-weight, portable source of energy for sawmills and other operations.

The new type of gas-operated turbine would have wide application in the Pacific Northwest lumber industry as it would make use of materials such as sawdust, hogged fuel and shavings now largely unused. At the same time it would provide power for sawmills and other plants isolated from electrical and water power.

Gas to operate the turbine is generated by burning wood under pressure in a specially designed furnace. Work in progress is aimed at determining the size of furnace required to operate a turbine large enough to supply power for a small mill.

Cooperating with the forest products lab are the Oregon State college engineering experiment station, which is contributing equipment and professional assistance, and the Boeing Airplane company of Seattle which is providing technical data.

Lion Hoopsters Begin Practice As 22-Game Schedule Looms

More than 80 potential hoopsters turned out last week when basketball coach Maurie Kreutz announced tryouts for the frosh and A and B squads of Cottage Grove union high school.

With the return of seven lettermen to the A squad, Kreutz is hoping for a good season, although, he says, "the boys are relatively untried in competition." The season schedule will open Dec. 5 at Sweet Home which gives the squad a little more than two weeks of practice.

Returning lettermen from last year's team include Ben Hilliker, Lowry Hoyer, Bill McBee, Wes Malcom, Dale Sears, Jim Webb, and J. C. Isley. Several have come up from the B squad including Ray Duer, Dick Piller and Don Mooney. Along with Ray Simonsen, who has had no previous varsity experience here, the above mentioned players will vie for starting positions.

Loss of several members of last year's quintet has cut into this year's chances, Kreutz said, and it will be difficult to find replacements. Especially missed will be guards Bob Gasper and Al Martin and center Larry Wolfard, all

three of whom have graduated.

Of the 22 games on the 12-week schedule, 16 contests will be with teams in this district. Last year the Grovers finished up with a strong second place in the district, right behind Eugene. Other schools in the competition include Oakridge, Junction City, Elmira, St. Francis, Springfield, University high, and Willamette.

First home game on the schedule is set for Dec. 8 with Oakridge. Only two other contests will be played here before the Christmas holidays, Lebanon on Dec. 19, and Elmira on Dec. 22. Activity on the floor will begin each evening at 6:45 p.m. when the B squads meet. Starting time for all A squad contests is 8 p.m.

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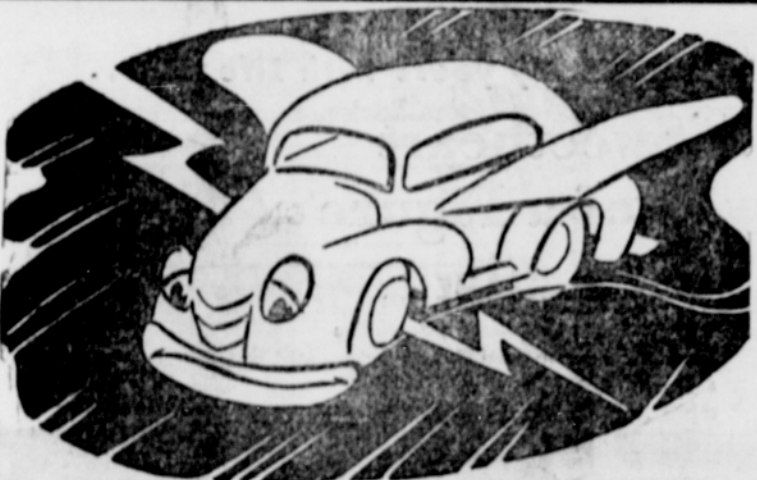
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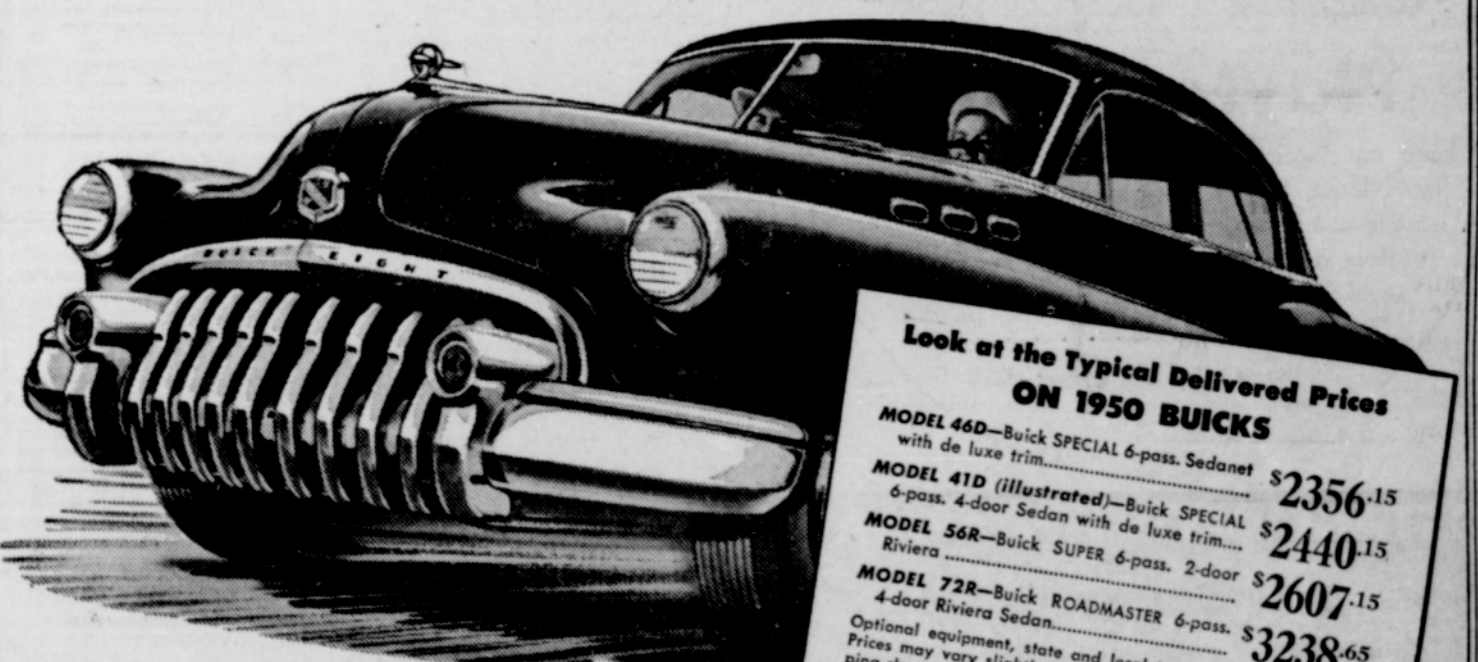
