

March of Dimes Goal Increased

The March of Dimes has raised its sights for next year and will try to collect \$50 million to fight polio—\$20 million more than was collected this year.

Announcement of the new and higher goal was made this week by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, sponsor of the annual campaign at New York.

He said the foundation must not only erase a \$5,000,000 deficit it expects by the end of the year, but must be prepared for new and higher costs following three years of excessive polio outbreaks.

He said this year is now rated the second worst on record, and follows the two successive record-breaking years of 1948 and 1949.

Latham taxpayers might like to know what the 66.7 mills given on their tax receipts pays for. Information from the assessor's office confirms these figures. Check them on the levy sheet which came with the tax receipt and save for future reference if you wish. School district 253, 11.9 mills; Union High school, 17.5 mills; Rural School Board Levy, 26.9 mills; Southern Lane County Rural Fire Protection Dist, 2.4 mills and State and County, 8 mills. The total is 66.7 mills.

Perhaps folks would understand the tax situation better if they would study it a little. However, these words which concluded a letter written by George A. Stock, assessor, in the Eugene Register-Guard are full of meaning: "It is only natural that all our governmental operating costs must expand along with our enormous population increase and general business expansion but the percentage increases above reflected are not consistent, which would appear to create an unequal distribution of our tax dollar. We should therefore exert every effort to economize and avoid spending to the point which will mean confiscation of our homes, thus preventing our whole economic collapse."

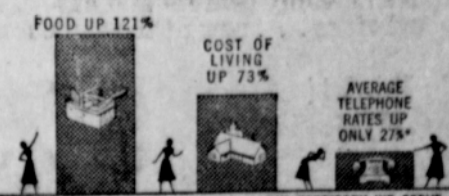
