Air Force Eases Up on Enlistments

Qualifications for enlistment of men with dependents in the U. S. Air Force have been eased, according to an announcement by Captain Meador of the recruiting office in Eugene.

All male applicants, including those with prior service in the army, air force, navy, marines, or coast guard, may be enlisted irrespective of the number of dependents providing they are eligible to enlist in grade of sergeant or higher. All male applicants, with or without prior service, may be enlisted providing they have no more than two dependents.

This easing of restrictions on dependents means that married men with no prior service may now enlist directly for the air force. For further information contact Sgt. Lucas L. Rutkowski at the recruiting office in Eugene or at the army in Cottage Grove Thursdays between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

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School Children Contribute For Fountain at UN

Pennies, nickels, and dimes, contributed voluntarily by the school children of Oregon will help to build the central fountain to be located in front of the Secretariat Building at United Nations Headquarters in New York.

Headed by Mrs. Douglas McKay, wife of Oregon's Governor, the Oregon drive is part of a national movement under the leadership of the wives of the Governors of the forty-eight states and of the territories of Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Mrs. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington is national chairman.

"We have the opportunity to participate in making a very significant gift to the United Nations," said Mrs. McKay. "It is a gift not large in money value, but one expressing our interest and faith in an organization that could prove to be the avenue for a better and more peaceful world."

Assisting Mrs. McKay is Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction, who will supervise organization of the schools in the drive. Schools were urged to contribute before December 15.

Screw Eyes Solve Cupboard Blues

Screw eyes can be a boon to homemakers wishing to put shelf dividers in their cupboards, reports Mary Beth Minden, Oregon State college extension home management specialist.

Oregon women are enthusiastic about solving storage problems in their kitchens through the use of these dividers. Their chief complaint, however, is that the upright partitions are too hard for most women to install.

Miss Minden suggests using four screws on the bottom shelf and four under the shelf above to hold a divider tightly. Or, short, narrow half shelves may be supported horizontally by screws installed in each end of the cupboard.

These dividers may be pulled out from between the screws when the shelves need washing. Then too, when a new pan is bought, the dividers can be moved to fit it by changing the location of the screws.

To set a screw eye, start the hole with a nail slightly smaller than the screw shank. Remove the nail and insert the screw. Soaping the shank makes it easier to twist into the wood.

OSC Plans Program Of Christmas Music

Oregon State College—More than 200 Oregon State college students will participate in a special music-for-Christmas program sponsored by the O.S.C. music department in the coliseum Sunday night, Dec. 3, at 8 p.m. The program is open to the general public without charge.

The college chorus of 160 voices and 52-piece college symphony orchestra will join in a general program of familiar Christmas music, with the audience taking part in some of the old, familiar songs. The orchestra, chorus, and Glee and Madrigal clubs will also play and sing separate numbers. This program will replace the "Messiah" which has been given as the Christmas program for the past three years.

Fewer Oregon Turkeys Seen In '51 Forecast

Fewer Oregon turkeys in 1951 were forecast at the annual fall meeting of the Oregon Turkey Improvement association this week.

Extension Poultry Specialist Neel Bennion of Oregon State college said the cut in market turkey production would approximate 10 per cent. He estimated Oregon would produce 1,465,200 next year as compared with 1,628,000 market birds this season.

The figures were arrived at by querying members of the Oregon Turkey Improvement association. Bennion's annual "intention" survey also included questions on the number of eggs and poult to be produced, expected asking prices, and number of breeder hens to be carried over.

The survey indicates that growers expect an average asking price of 29 cents per egg next spring. Hatcherymen expect to receive 70 cents apiece for newly hatched turkey poults. Both figures are about a three per cent hike over 1950 receiving prices.

At least partially due to an over-abundance of market turkeys this season, Oregon turkey breeders indicated they will cut their breeder hen carry-over by 25 per cent. There were 259,000 breeder hens in Oregon this year. The survey shows an intent to carry-over about 194,000 into the 1951 egg laying season.

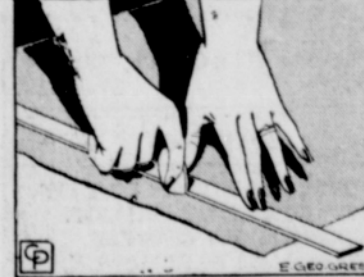
Messy Cupboards Can Be Avoided

Clutter in the cupboard can be avoided by some thoughtful rearranging, according to Mary Beth Minden, Oregon State college extension home management specialist.

First, decide on the things really needed in the storage area. Banish seldom used or duplicate articles to a less convenient cupboard. After eliminating all but the bare essentials, work out the arrangement within the cupboard. The most frequently used kitchen tools and containers are handily stored when they require no stretching or bending to reach them. Objects used at the same time are stored together. Like articles may be stacked, but stacking unlike articles means extra handling.

Lastly, plan to use storage conveniences, Miss Minden suggests. An extra rack, a verticle divider, hooks or a half shelf help the homemaker to pick articles out of her cupboard without disturbing other items.
