Unemployment Rolls Increase

Compensation paid to unemployed workers declined in October to the lowest figure in two years but claims were rising slightly in the last half of the month, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported today.

Payments were \$483,295, a drop of 11.4 percent from September and 65.5 percent lower than the October, 1949 figure of \$1,403,104. The total for the first ten months of 1950, however, reached \$18,563,296, highest on record and 20.9 percent above the same period last year.

Much of the increase shown this year was attributable to the long spell of cold weather in January and February, and the discontinuance in August, 1949 of most veterans' readjustment allowances under the GI bill of Rights. The expected 1950 total of just over \$20 millions will be materially lower than combined totals of state and federal payments in either 1946 or 1949.

Barely 30,000 workers have filed claims for unemployment insurance since the start of the 1950-51 benefit year last July 1. This compares with 61,059 a year ago and 27,355 in 1948. Of current claimants, 16,308 have drawn their first check and 1,266 have exhausted their annual benefit amount—comparing with 36,249 first payments and 2,489 exhaustions a year ago.

Compensable claims rose during the final week of October to 6,637 as against a 1950 low of 5,657 reached in mid-month. A year ago 19,471 persons were asking unemployment insurance. Initial claims, denoting a new period without work, were 2,460 last week against 5,371 a year ago.
