Head of Munitions

A patient has been developed which covers the application of lacquers at elevated temperatures—for example 150° to 180° Fahrenheit. Many vegetable gardeners will use a new insecticide for the first time this year. It is methoxychlor, a close relative of DDT, but far less poisonous. The new insecticide does not injure foliage or stunt growth of plants.

Started Pullet

Started chicks or started pullets are pullets chicks that have been brooded at the hatchery past the danger point and may be continued upon their arrival at the farm. As at which they are sold are two weeks, three weeks, four weeks, and as long as six eight weeks. The latter are known as range size pullets.

Conservation

Have steep or wet fields in sod, moderately steep or imperfectly drained fields, or hay at least half of the time, and use the flitter and better drained fields for intensive crop production.
