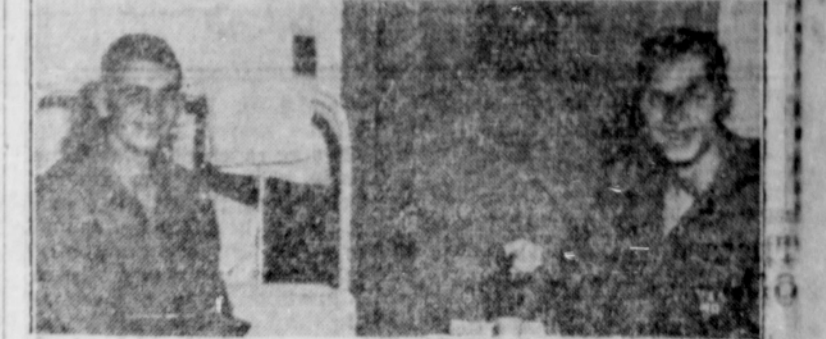
The next December meeting will be dispensed with, and the club will hold its next meeting on January 9.

COOKERY CORNER

Pineapple Refrigerator Cake

WHAT better time than this to brush up on that boon to the harried housewife, the refrigerator dessert? Prepared in the cool of day, left in the refrigerator to set, there it is, cool and delicious, ready to wind up the evening meal.

Pineapple Refrigerator Cake offers a nice change to ice cream, or parfait or mousse, good as these goodies may be. Cream 1/2 c. butter and one c. sugar together until light and fluffy. Add one beaten egg, 2 tsp. cream and 2 c. drained, crushed pineapple. Put a layer 1/2 inch thick of crumbs taken from 2 c. graham cracker crumbs in the bottom of a buttered spring mould. Moisten layer with 4 tsp. pineapple juice. Add a layer of pineapple mixture, then repeat, adding alternate layers of crumbs with pineapple juice, and the pineapple mixture. Chill in refrigerator 6 to 8 hours or longer. It may even stay as long as 24 hours. Remove from mould. Decorate with sweetened flavored whipped cream and garnish with candied cherries.

Crushed berries and their juice may be substituted for the pineapple as a nice variation.

Nice Surprise

Lemon Sherbet is a pleasant surprise for dieters. To serve 4, stir 4 tsp. lemon juice and one c. sugar until latter is dissolved. Add 2 c. rich milk. Chill. Place in refrigerator tray. When the sherbet is cold enough to be mushy,

remove pan and stir. Repeat the stirring at half-hour intervals. Takes 3 hours to freeze.

Orange Ice with cookies makes a pleasing and different dessert. To serve 6, cook 3/4 c. sugar, 1/2 c. light corn syrup and 1/2 c. water until mixture forms a soft ball when a little of the syrup is dropped from a spoon into a glass of cold water or until a candy thermometer registers 238 F. Remove from stove. Add 1 1/2 c. orange juice and 3 tsp. lemon juice. Chill. Place in refrigerator trays. When mixture begins to freeze, remove trays; stir. Repeat, stirring twice at half hour intervals, then finish freezing without any more stirring.

Can of Fruit

For just about the easiest dessert pour a medium-sized can of fruit into refrigerator tray. When it has been partially frozen serve with whipped cream which has been flavored and sweetened. Decorate with maraschino cherries.

For an easily-prepared peppermint ice cream for 6, dissolve 2 tsp. plain unflavored gelatin in 1/4 c. water. Dissolve 1/4 lb. peppermint candy in 3/4 c. milk in double boiler. Add the gelatin. Chill, whip 2 c. whipping cream. Add the whipped cream to the chilled mixture. Place in refrigerator trays. When frozen to a mush, stir, then stir twice again at half hour intervals, after which continue freezing without further stirring.

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
