

Pedestrians Must Be Careful at Night

The Oregon State Motor Association today suggested that Oregonians make the holiday period a "darkness saving time," by driving and walking carefully so as to prevent pedestrian accidents during the long hours of darkness.

Seventy per cent of Oregon's pedestrian fatalities occur during the hours of darkness and the Association pointed out that the winter holiday period is a time of long hours of darkness.

Statistics show that a heavy proportion of the pedestrian accidents involve persons walking across streets as cars approach. Apparently, the motor club said, the person on foot is confident the driver can see him because of the brilliance of the vehicle lights.

"Investigation has shown," the Association said, "that in many cases, particularly during rain storms and in fog or snow, the driver will not see a person dressed in dark clothing till within less than 50 feet. Often that does not allow time enough for the driver to do anything to avoid hitting the pedestrian."

The Association urged the pedestrian to watch for approaching cars and to wait till they pass before starting across. Crossing in mid-block was warned against, as was crossing signalized intersections against the light.

"If careful walking and careful driving could prevent 70 per cent of the pedestrian accidents during the holiday season, it certainly should be a worthwhile effort," the Association suggested.

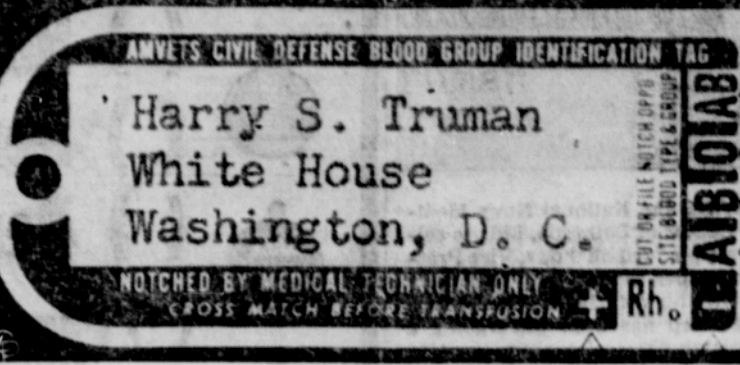

HST GETS CIVIL DEFENSE 'DOG TAG'



THE FIRST of 150,000,000 radiation-resistant "dog tags" (bottom) is presented to President Truman at the White House by Gen. Alexander A. Vandegrift, AMVET Chief of Civilian Defense. The tags will be distributed to every person in the United States. On receiving the tag, any citizen may report at a blood typing station, where his blood group and RH blood type will be determined and identified by a notch on edge. Thus, in the event of possible war and home front casualties, blood could be supplied without delay by checking the tags. (International)

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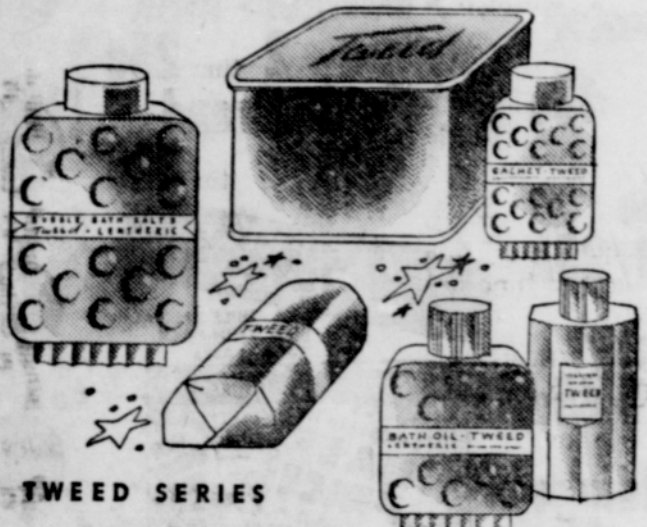
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
