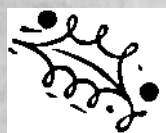


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'Christmas Story' Is Presented at Women's Meeting

COOKERY CORNER

Making Ice Cream at Home

TOPS in warm weather delights, for youngsters and for most grown-ups, too, is ice cream and plenty of it. The intake of ice cream usually rises in ratio to the thermometer, so it is the wise homemaker who keeps a good supply at hand. While it is grand to run out to the corner store for ice cream, it is nice, very nice, once in a while to whip up a home-made batch, something that it is very simple and fun to do. No matter the time, the day, it's a jiffy job to fill the ice cream trays with delicious ice cream.

Begin by setting the refrigerator control to the coldest point. Then, for ever-popular vanilla, mix ½ c. sweetened condensed milk, ½ c. water and 1½ tsp. vanilla. Chill. Whip one c. heavy cream to custard-like consistency. Fold into chilled mixture. Pour into freezing tray, cover with waxed paper, and forget about it for about an hour. By then it will have frozen a firm mush. Turn mixture into chilled bowl, break up with a fork, then beat with egg beater until fluffy but not melted. Quickly return to tray; cover again with waxed paper. Return to freezing unit, and freeze until firm. Makes 1½ pints.

Good Variation

For a variation, sure to go down well with the small fry, try Peppermint Stick Ice Cream. Mix ¾ c. sweetened condensed milk and ½ c. water. Chill. Whip one c. heavy cream to custard-like consistency. Fold into chilled mixture. Four into freezing tray. Cover with waxed paper. Freeze to firm mush (about an hour). Turn into chilled bowl, break up with fork, and beat with egg beater until fluffy but not melted. Fold in one c. crushed peppermint stick candy. Quickly return to tray, cover with waxed paper. Return to freezing unit, and freeze until firm.

For an extra added treat, hand out some cookies, easy to make, and just the right bite with ice cream. To make about 30 cookies mix 1½ c. sweetened condensed milk, ½ c. peanut butter and any one of the following ingredients: 2 c. raisins, 2 c. corn flakes, 3 c. shredded coconut, 2 c. bran flakes, one c. chopped nuts or 2 c. chopped dates. Drop mixture by teaspoonfuls onto a well-greased baking sheet. Bake in 375 F. oven for 12 min. or until brown.
