

Driving With Parking Lights Is Dangerous

At least one Oregon resident was killed during November as the result of a driver using parking lights while driving in fog, Captain Walter Lansing said today.

Lansing, a state police officer

who now heads the Secretary of State's traffic safety division, warned again that use of parking lights in foggy weather, instead of regular headlights, is not only a violation of law but an open invitation to a traffic accident.

In the death mentioned, Lansing said a woman was killed when her husband started to pass a car and met head-on another car using only parking lights. The husband stated that he could not see the

other car until it loomed up directly in front of him.

"This is just one example," Lansing said, "of what driving with parking lights can lead to. Other motorists cannot see you until they are almost upon you, and further, you cannot see the highway clearly."

Parking lights, Lansing concluded, were never meant for foggy weather driving.

University of Oregon, Eugene, (Special) Organizations throughout Oregon may hear members of the university symposium discuss one of three questions of local and national interest during winter and spring term.

Subjects the group will discuss are:

What should be the attitude of the people of the Northwest toward the Columbia Valley Administration?

Should the non-communist nations form a new international organization?

What should be the responsibility of the federal government for the welfare of the people of the United States?

Students participating in the symposium are William Lees, Donald Collin, Nancy O'Connor, and Elmer Hibbs, all of Portland; Nancy Yates, Norman Fugitt, Robert Bozorth, Ivan Hoyer, Robert Peterson, John Hoyer, Mark Patterson, Bellevue, Idaho; Grace Sargent, Weiser, Idaho; Karl Harshbarger, North Liberty, Iowa; and Morris Sahr, Schenectady, New York.

The Symposiums will be conducted by groups of three or four of the above students. This fall term has been devoted to research on the topics, and several authorities have spoken before the students.

Service clubs, fraternal societies, granges, women's clubs, and church, high school, and college groups are being contacted and asked if they would like to hear a group discussion on one of the questions. W. A. Dahlberg, associate professor of speech, and Herman Cohen, instructor in speech, are in charge of the symposium.

Seven university foreign students are also available through the university speech department for appearances. They will speak on problems and customs of their homelands. They are Arne Daring, Sweden; Oskar Hoessl, Heinrich Marschik, and Heldegard Ziegler, all of Germany; Maurice Morello, France; Leopold Pospisil, Czechoslovakia; and Yoshiko Seki, Japan.

Authorities Offer Solution for Tree Flameproofing

Although no "fireproofing" solution for the highly combustible Yule tree has been officially tested and recognized, it is now possible to safeguard many flammable holiday decorations, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

A mixture the fire authorities suggest is one that will make party decorations, children's costumes and even some of their especially hazardous toys fire-retardant. If they should catch fire, they might char a little, but they won't blaze up, spreading the fire.

The rinse consists of 9 ounces of borax, 4 ounces of boric acid and one gallon of warm water. Mix the borax and half the water until dissolved, then mix the boric acid with the rest of the water. Combine the two and dip the garments to be flameproofed in the mixture.

Anything that's safe in water can be rinsed in the solution. It should be applied each time the material is washed, since the mixture washes off. For heavy drapes or furniture upholstery, the solution can be sprayed on.

Also available are commercially packaged compounds which may be more satisfactory for use on certain fabrics.

Experts Tell How Portable Heaters May Be Used Safely

"A portable heater is a portable fire," the National Board of Fire Underwriters points out in urging extra care with these devices, which have caused many disastrous blazes.

Many heaters are manufactured with safety factors in mind, the organization says. In selecting new heaters, buyers should insist on evidence that the heater is listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., which means the device has been tested for safety.

Users should follow the manufacturers' directions carefully, and

use only those fuels for which the heater was designed.

The heater should be placed on a level floor, to reduce the danger of tipping, and should not be located near curtains, furniture, or other combustibles.

It is dangerous to carry the heater when it is lighted, and it should never be filled when lighted. It should be refilled outdoors.

Fumes from the heater can be deadly, if it is left burning in a tightly closed room. A window should be left open or a door ajar whenever the heater is in use.

Faulty lighting is believed to be a factor in the figures showing that 95 per cent of all children have normal eyesight when they are born, but that 31 per cent need glasses by the time they reach post-college age.
