Rod and Gun Club Sponsors Wildlife Movie

Jim Bond, noted Portland big game hunter and explorer, has just returned from the upper Yukon where for the past few months he has been exploring and filming wildlife scenes. No one has higher standing among Oregon sportsmen than Jim Bond whose movies of wildlife in the far north have thrilled thousands of persons over a large portion of the nation.

The Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club in cooperation with the Izaak Walton League and the Oregon Wildlife Federation is sponsoring a show Friday at the Diane theater showing the color film Jim Bond has brought back with him. Bond—one of America's leading outdoorsmen—has spent many years exploring the Yukon and observing the many different types of wild game native to this territory.

If he were merely a hunter, his experiences would mean little . . . consisting chiefly of the kill. But Bond explains his trips afield in this way:

"Hunting is my business—and I like my work. First, I hunt with cameras, to capture the wild things on motion picture film that I may bring to others the vicarious thrill of a big game hunt. I couldn't make those pictures authoritative unless I hunted with a rifle, too, so I hunt for trophies as well as pictures; and, there would not be ample justification for my business unless I told the story of conservation so I study wildlife that I may know more about it. I write, too, and am the author of the books, "From Out of the Yukon" and "America's No. 1 Big Trophy."

In his color motion picture called "Life in the Wilderness" Jim Bond has captured unusual scenes showing the wild and rugged country in the Olympic mountain regions. He also has

Boasting an all-veteran quintet, the Warriors are considered one of the top-notch teams in the state. They just missed playing in the state tournament last March.

Sparking the Warrior attack will be Forward Bob Hinman and Center Wayne Holzfuss. The latter is a six-foot five-inch pivot man, while Hinman is a one-hand long shot artist. The Cottage Grove-Lebanon A squad game will begin at 8 p.m. Tuesday, and the B squads will start things off at 6:45 p.m.

Oakridge handed the Lions their first loss of the season Friday when they invaded the Grove court and came out on top by a 39-32 margin. Although Grover Ben Hilliker was high point man for the evening with 18 tallies, other members of the local squad weren't able to connect with the bucket.

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Warner Valley Lands to Be Used For Game Refuge

A cooperative agreement calling for management of federal lands in Warner valley for stock grazing and wildlife use was signed Tuesday in Portland by Daniel L. Goldy, bureau of land management regional administrator, C. A. Lockwood, Oregon state game commission director, and Leo Laythe, U. S. fish and wildlife service regional director.

The three-way pact is a step towards establishing the Lake county valley as a key waterfowl resting and breeding area in conjunction with a livestock industry. The pact provides for continued management of stock grazing resources on Warner valley public lands by the bureau of land management and joint management and protection of wildlife resources by the three agencies involved.

Included in the agreement are 29,000 acres of federal land, located mainly in marginal areas at the north end of the mountain-rimmed valley. State lands, composed almost entirely of large lake beds, including the 1,500 acre Petri marsh, are not involved in the present agreement. The game commission regards Petri marsh as the heart of the Warner valley waterfowl breeding area.

The present agreement is part of a recommendation made recently by the Lakeview chamber of Commerce which has taken an active interest in the Warner valley question.

Stockmen, wildlife interests, and agriculturists have taken a keen interest in the status of Warner valley lands, both state and federal, since 1948 when the state land board revealed plans for reclamation and development work in the valley involving 33,000 acres of state land. These lands are part of the irreducible school fund under the jurisdiction of the land board.

Wildlife authorities, including Dr. Ira Gabrielson of the wildlife management institute, recognize Warner valley as one of the most important remaining breeding areas for ducks and geese in the United States. The valley is also a vital link in the Pacific flyway for ducks and geese.

As a result of the present agreement, a public hearing scheduled at Lakeview for December 11 to consider a proposal of the fish and wildlife service to withdraw the public lands for wildlife and stock grazing purposes will not be held.

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AAU Champs and OSC Basketeers Tangle Saturday

Oregon State College, Corvallis, —Oregon State's travel-weary basketeers, losers in all five games on a barnstorming tour into the east and midwest, returned home Sunday night and began looking ahead to the home opener in Gill Coliseum next Saturday night with the national AAU champion Phillips Oilers of Bartlesville, Oklahoma.

Despite the losses, the pre-season jaunt was not too discouraging. The Beavers faced some of the top quints in the country, which should aid them in the forthcoming northern division hoop chase.

The Orangemen dropped a 54-47 decision to Canisius at Buffalo before 10,246 fans. Their next stop was Madison Square Garden, where 12,000 watched them lose a 75-65 battle to New York University. In that contest, the score was tied four times in the last 12 minutes, before the Violets finally pulled it out of the fire.

Probably the best showing was made at Peoria against Bradley, the nation's second-ranking team. Oregon State outscored the Braves in field goals, 31-24, but Bradley picked up 29 free throws to insure a close 77-74 victory. The Associated Press account said it was by far the most thrilling fray seen on the Bradley maple in a long time.

Coach Slat's Gill's club weakened badly against Illinois and Indiana, which in part, can be attributed to the rugged task of facing top-notch opposition on three successive nights while on the road. Illinois won 74-51, and the Hoosiers emerged victorious, 72-45.

Veteran forward Bob Payne, the squad's leading pointmaker last season, connected for 28 field goals and 15 charity tosses for 71 points on the trip to top the Beavers. Danny Johnston, the prize sophomore transfer guard, was next in line with 51 tallies. Payne's average was 14.2 per contest and Johnston's 10.2.

When Bradley's Braves scored 77 points to defeat Oregon State at Peoria last week, it was the most points ever tallied against a Slat's Gill-coached club. Previous high was 72, a total compiled by Oregon in two-overtime periods two seasons ago.

White River Deer Hunt Successful

The White river special deer hunt ending December 5 was the most successful hunt of the season, game commission checking station figures reveal. Game agents checked 291 hunters into the northern Wasco county area and 251 deer were brought out through the checking stations.

This was the last of three special deer seasons held in game damage areas. Deer taken at White river are described as part of a large migratory herd that winters in the area, causing extensive damage to winter wheat crops. Three hundred antlerless deer permits were authorized for the White river hunt.
