A special offering to strengthen mission work started by Seventh-day Adventist service men in New Guinea during World War II will be taken Saturday, Dec. 30, at the local Adventist church. Latest reports reveal five churches have grown from a small company organized by these "GI missionaries."

The offering to be taken in the 16,176 Adventist Sabbath schools of the world will also aid mission schools in Borneo and the Celebes, and establish an evangelistic center in Manila.

Every three months Adventist Sabbath schools select a mission field as their "project." Each Saturday the period study is given to the various needs of the place chosen. On the last Saturday a special offering is taken. The project for the first three months of 1951 will be the Adventist medical and educational work in South Africa.

The December 23, 1949 issue of "The Sentinel" told of the offering taken at that time for a hospital at Belem, Brazil on the Amazon. Several weeks ago Dr. and Mrs. M. H. Schaffner had the privilege of seeing pictures of the hospital built in that place from the funds raised. Pictures of the work on the "mighty Amazon" were shown at Roseburg by Elder Halliwell, a missionary in South America for many years.

QUEST FOR TRUTH

What Manner of Person Ought Ye to Be in 1951?

1951 should be the best year of our Christian experience. "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness . . . Nevertheless we, according to his promise, look for new heavens and a new earth . . . Wherefore, beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot, and blameless." II Peter 3:11-14. The only true success, the only true wealth, is to have a character like Christ. May we suggest three important factors for becoming what God would have us to be in 1951?

First, there must be proper spiritual nourishment. Peter tells us to "desire the sincere milk of the word" (I Peter 2:2). Jesus taught "Sanctify them through thy truth; thy word is truth." John 17:17. If you have not yet enrolled in our free Bible course of 30 lessons, we suggest that at the very start of 1951 you begin these helpful studies. II Peter 3:18 bids us "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

The second point of growing God-like is prayer, which has been called the breath of the soul. To sustain spiritual life we must have contact with God. I Thess. 5:17.

The third factor is spiritual exercise. You are the only Bible some folks read. We need to advance in our individual spiritual lives so that we can advance in soul-winning service.
