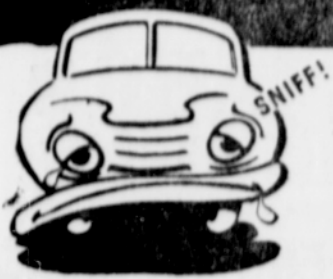
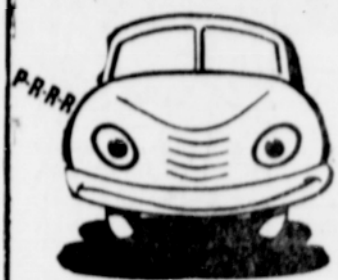


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Daugherty's Lady Bowlers Move Into First Place

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Kanel had a card from their son Bill, who is in the army and he was on his way to a camp in Georgia.

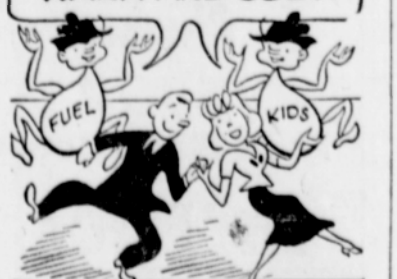

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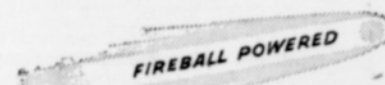
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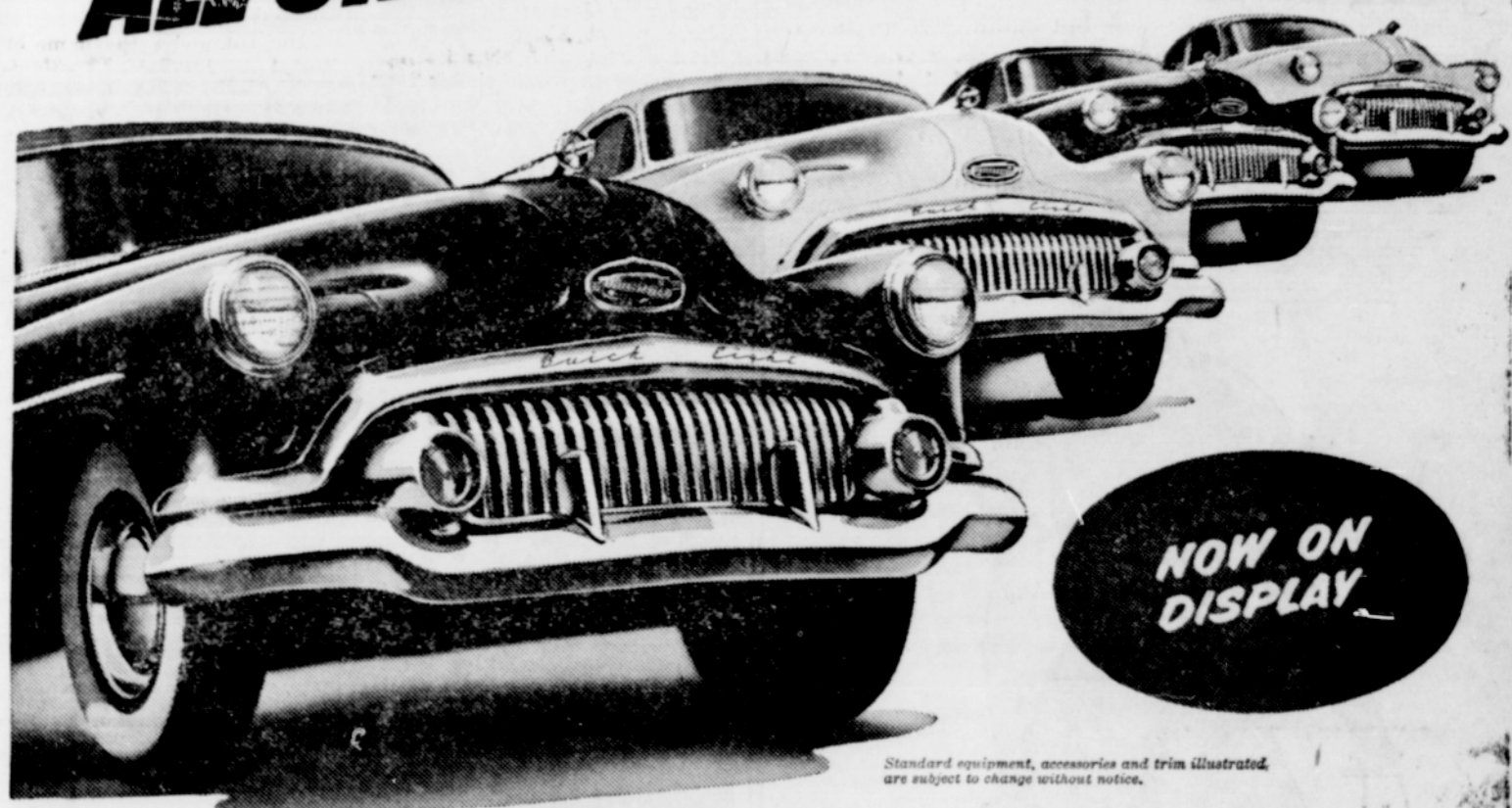
