sewerage and drainage system, and striving for a more adequate water supply.

A meeting of the Daughters of the Nile is set for Feb. 7, at 8 p.m. at the home of Mrs. P. B. Webb.

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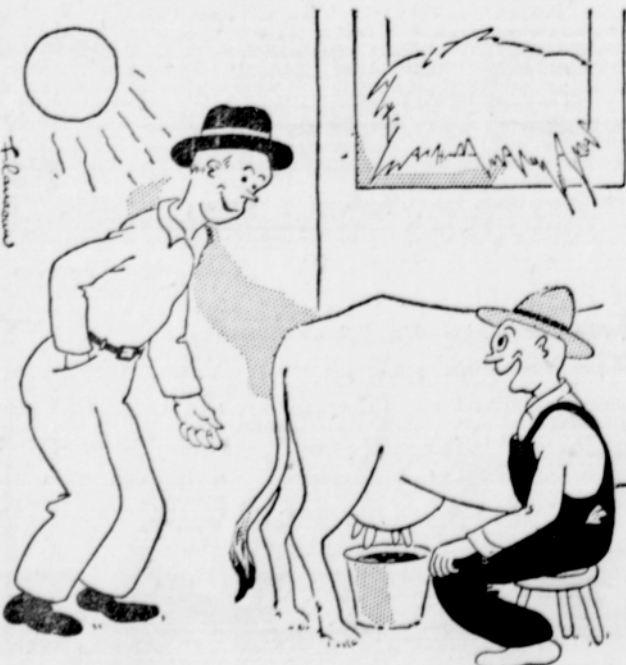
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
