Cancellations of Old Post Offices Are Being Sought

Lance Naish of the Cottage Grove post office spoke to members of the South Lane Stamp Society at the regular meeting of the club Thursday evening.

Using the hypothetical case of a registered letter which is sent from Cottage Grove to Calcutta, India, Naish traced its route and explained the handling of such a letter. He also told club members about the technical work of the post office department.

A brief talk was also given by Dean Davis, president of the Eugene Stamp society, who spoke on cancellations. He told of the need for more information concerning the postal history of the Cottage Grove area.

A compilation of Oregon post offices is being made and more facts are needed pertaining to post offices which have been discontinued. Especially needed are old envelopes with the post office name and date on the cancellation, signatures of the postmasters and dates without stamps, or letters concerning the carrying of mail, postmaster's information, Civil War covers (envelopes), or patriotic pictures.

Cancellations of now-defunct post offices are also needed, namely Wells Fargo, Lemati, De-Moss Springs, Starr, Mineral and London. The names of the first postmaster and his successors are also being sought.

Termite Control Suggested By Housing Specialist

Termites are more of a homeowners problem in the Pacific northwest than most persons realize, according to John C. Campbell, housing specialist at Oregon State college, who has a six-point plan to avoid damage from the wood-boring nuisance.

It is true, the specialist added, that Oregon is not subject to extensive termite damage similar to that which occurs in southern areas of the United States. However, many homes are termite infested and severe damage is being inflicted to sills, posts, floor joists and other structural members.

Where termites are present in nearly all cases it is because sound building practices have not been followed, Campbell said.

Chief building offenses which open the way to termite infestations are allowing wood skirts around a house to come in contact with the soil; and building sub-standard porches where posts extend into the ground.

Most termite damage can be prevented by using sound, recommended building procedures. Campbell's six points are:

1. Place no untreated wood within 18 inches of the ground beneath a house and none within 8 inches outside the foundation.
2. Remove all stumps and wood-end debris from beneath or near the building.
3. Use only lumber which is reasonably dry and free of decay.

4. Provide adequate ventilation beneath the building, especially when the building is constructed without a basement. The rule is at least one square foot of vent area per 25 feet of foundation wall length.
5. Avoid an accumulation of water beneath a building from leaking pipes, inadequate soil and drainage, and from other sources.

6. Use treated wood members when they are laid directly on concrete. Treated wood refers to lumber preserved by pressure process.

Pedestrians Told To Be Careful

Winter's short days, plus rain, sleet, snow or fog make it almost impossible for motorists to see a careless pedestrian in time to avoid an accident, the secretary of state's traffic safety division warned today.

Accident records thus far in January indicate that at least four Oregon traffic deaths have been pedestrians, a fact that points up the need for extra precaution on the part of the person on foot, the division stated.

City pedestrians, particularly, bear the brunt of their own carelessness, safety men warned. Stepping from curbs without looking, jaywalking, wearing dark clothing at night and trusting in a driver to avoid hitting them are sure indications of a careless pedestrian.

The safety men also made it clear that the driver's usual alibi in pedestrian accidents—"I didn't see him"—also bears extra scrutiny. The excuse for a driver not seeing a pedestrian because of a smeared windshield or defective windshield wipers and defrosters is not considered valid. It takes a driver only a few minutes to clean a windshield. It takes months and hundreds of dollars to repair a human body, the safety men concluded.



Collect Elephants?

Last week we described topical collection of stamps in conjunction with your hobby of collecting various subjects.

Elephants are an inspiring sight to the adult as well as children. The pachyderm supplies meat to the Africans, it is a means of transportation, as well as a source of ivory, from which many articles are made.

There are roughly three kinds of elephants—the African, the Asian and pygmy. The Siamese elephant differs from the other Asians in color, being a dirty grayish white instead of the common black gray.

More than 600 stamps show elephants. There are 30 countries listed with this representation.

Ivory is mentioned several times in the Bible—I Kings 10:22, 18; II Chronicles 9:17; Psalms 45:8; Ezekiel 27:15; Amos 3:15.

Speaking of religious subjects, the stamps of the world show many phases of various rites, customs, costumes and churches.

The Vatican City is one of a few whose stamps can be completed as a collection. The total value of this collection can be acquired for less than \$100 if one wishes to buy all of the stamps.

Most collectors prefer to trade stamps for stamps rather than outright purchase and then only to fill a set that has an elusive single one which is of higher value or limited issue.

Fourteen different churches are depicted on a single stamp issued by Italy. This is a montage arranged by Professor Corrado Mezzana, the Roman stamp designer (Scott Catalogue No. A296).

The term "lumber," referring to sawn timber, appears to have originated in Boston. As far as is known, the earliest official use of the word was made in records dating from 1663 which listed "lumber and other goods."

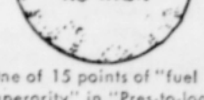
