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Angling Regulations Change McKenzie River Opening Date

The angling regulations for Oregon were set by the game commission following the second public hearing recently.

Few changes were made in the tentative regulations announced several weeks ago. One major change was the opening date for the McKenzie river. The McKenzie opening day will be April 14 in conformity with the general opening date for the remainder of zone 2 and zone 1. Tentative regulations had set an opening date of April 28.

Another change was the setting of a special bag limit for jack salmon effective October 1 to November 15 in zone 1. During this period the separate bag limit of jack salmon will be 10 a day and 20 in possession. The opening of the general trout season in Lake county was changed to May 20. There will be no bag limit on bass or other warm-water game fish.

Other changes in the regulations by angling zones are as follows:

In zone 1 (coastal streams) the following waters will be added to the list that are closed to angling at all times. All tributaries of the

north and south forks of the Trask river; the south fork of the Trask river; the north fork of the Trask river about Bark Shanty creek; and the Nehalem river was adjusted to conform with last season's regulation. The deadline for winter fishing on the north fork of the Alsea river was moved up to the highway bridge just below the Alsea trout hatchery.

In zone 2 (Willamette and Hood river watersheds) the Sandy river up to Dabney state park will be included in the list of waters open to winter fishing, with a bag limit of 2 fish 12 inches or over per day or 4 a week or in possession. The Clackamas river and tributaries will be closed to salmon angling from July 1 to September 30. The Oregon City deadline was lowered 20 feet on the east side. A bag limit of 10 fish per day and 10 fish in possession was set for Fish Lake in Linn county.

In zone 3 (Deschutes watershed) Blue lake will have a section that lies within a radius of 50 feet from the mouth of Link creek closed to angling. A bag limit on mackinaw trout over 20 inches in length of 2 fish a day and 4 in possession was set for Odell lake. Mill and Chenoweth creeks will be open to angling all year. Rock creek reservoir will close July 15.

In zone 6 (Klamath and Goose lake basins) Drews creek and tributaries below the first railroad crossing will open March 15.

In zone 7 (John Day and Umatilla watersheds) the Columbia river from McNary dam downstream to a line across the river from the government ferry landing on the Oregon shore to red and white markers on the Washington shore will be closed to angling. Opening of the Umatilla river below Cold Springs intake to steelhead and salmon fishing the year around completes the list of changes from the tentative regulations.

A legal draft of the final angling regulations must be filed with the Secretary of State before the regulations take effect. According to the game commission, the filing will be completed by February 10.

Register Now for Fishing Class

Registration for the stream lore and fly casting class to be conducted by Ernest Drenner is now open and persons interested may sign up at Edwards Outdoor store.

The class, which will begin around the first week in March, will be held at the high school. High school students may register with Bob Dusenberry. Drenner asks that all registrations be made within two weeks so that further plans may be formulated.

A minimum fee will be charged for the class, but the amount will depend upon the number enrolled. Both men and women are invited to sign up.

It is not necessary to own fishing equipment to register for this class. Instruction will be held one evening a week.

Fishery Agent Hopes to Trace Umpqua Rainbow

With the aid of some ardent anglers, Bill Pitney, game commission fishery agent, hopes to prove conclusively this winter that fall-spawning rainbow trout released in the Umpqua river return as steelhead.

Over 3,600 hatchery-bred rainbow bearing a metal tag on their lower left jaw have been released in the Umpqua as year-old fish for the past three years. Supposedly hatchery-bred rainbow remain in the streams, but Pitney feels many of these fish have steelhead tendencies, heading out to sea as year-old fish and returning two years later as steelhead.

Several months after release, one of the jaw-tagged rainbow was taken 32 miles downstream from its point of release. Creel census work on the Umpqua has shown on the average only 20 per cent of the fall-spawning fish released in the river ever reach the angler's creel.

This winter, jaw-tagged rainbow released in the spring of 1948 should return from the sea if they have reverted to the steelhead tendency. Fin clipping has been used extensively for trout studies, but a fish that spends several years at sea may regenerate a new fin or even lose a fin in an accident. Four steelhead with missing fins taken on the lower Columbia river in 1944 and 1945 were believed to be from a plant of fall-spawning rainbow made in 1941 on the upper Clackamas river, but more conclusive proof is needed. Possibly an Umpqua steelhead will provide that proof this winter.

Pitney is also anxious to know what effect the jaw tag had on the fish. There is a possibility the tags became imbedded in the fish's jaw or caused serious injury. Any jaw-tagged fish should be reported to the southwest regional game office in Roseburg. Pitney urges that the tag be saved because each tag bears a serial number recorded at the time the fish was released. "Weights, measurements, and even the head of the fish would also provide valuable information," Pitney said.

Mild Winter Means Favorable Outlook For Deer and Elk

A favorable outlook for Oregon's deer and elk herds is indicated in big game winter range survey reports received by the game commission from the five regional game districts.

A mild, open winter has prevailed on nearly all big game ranges and deer and elk herds are widely scattered over much summer as well as winter range, report the game agents.

December and the first two weeks of January are the period in which the game agents normally carry out deer and elk composition studies, but wide scattering of the animals has hampered this winter's work. By mid-January, the buck deer are shedding their antlers, and buck-deer ratios can no longer be taken.

Deer herds sampled in the southeastern Oregon game region revealed a ratio of one buck to 5.8 does, and in the central Oregon game region, the ratio was one buck to 4.2 does. Generally, the commission states that the average buck-deer ratio in eastern Oregon is as good or better than last year while the 1950 fawn crop appears to be slightly lower, the observed ratio in Deschutes and Cook counties being one fawn to 1.6 does.

Although shrub and grass growth has been good, the game agents warn that many of the major mule deer winter ranges are in critical condition, and if a severe winter were to set in, heavy losses could be expected.

Hunters Asked To Assist With State Game Survey

Incomplete tag returns tabulated by the game commission for the regular 1950 deer season show a kill of 30,611 buck deer by 107,636 hunters. A total of 171,000 deer tags were issued during the 1950 season, including 626 non-resident deer tags.

Use of the separate deer tag, initiated in 1948, has provided the first complete evaluation of Oregon's annual deer harvest. In 1948, 166,618 hunters killed 39,785 deer and in 1949, 163,628 hunters killed 57,260 deer.

A group of 5,000 Oregon hunters, chosen at random from hunting license files, will receive a questionnaire from the game commission in March. Each sportsman selected will be asked whether or not he hunted deer, elk, pheasants, quail, and waterfowl during 1950 and, if so, what his bag was. This information will be correlated with 1950 hunting license sales and with deer and elk tag returns. A complete analysis of the 1950 hunting season, including a breakdown by counties, will then be made.

Bob Mace, chief of the commission's big game division, who is directing the survey, urges each livestock brand inspection work in this district and will also handle some inspection work from time to time.

hunter receiving a questionnaire to cooperate. "In this type of survey," stresses Mace, "every questionnaire must be returned." Telegrams and personal interviews are planned as a follow-up on those sportsmen not reporting. According to Mace, all information obtained will be used solely for purpose of game management.

A series of net sets and temperature readings revealed the secret of obtaining lake trout eggs at Odell lake and this fall 56,490 eggs were taken. In 1951 no difficulty is anticipated in satisfying the department's requirements for eggs of this species.

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
