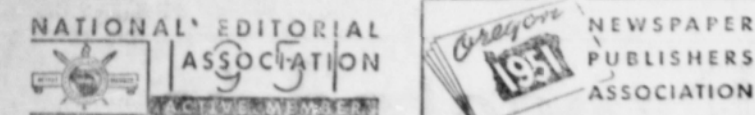

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WE PITY THE POOR PATIENTS

There is just one thing that may mar the opening of our new hospital, an event for which we have worked and waited for many years. That one drawback is the lack of decent streets in the vicinity of the hospital.

It doesn't seem logical to us to invest over \$300,000 in building and equipment, and at the same time overlook the condition of the streets over which patients must travel. The two blocks each of "M" and "N" Streets leading from Main Street to the hospital include some of the bumpiest stretches in town—and that in itself is quite a statement.

No ambulance driver would dare progress along these streets at much more than a crawl, in deference to the patient as well as the ambulance. It might be almost safer to drive the 22 miles to Eugene, where at least it is a smooth pavement all the way.

There are two ways to have good streets, which have been used by progressive towns in the past. One is by special bond issue, for which property owners adjacent to the street to be improved would pay. The cost of this improvement would depend on the type of surfacing chosen by the city.

The other way would be to set up a special street improvement fund in the city budget. This method would create the necessity of a special election since any appreciable sum thus set aside would force the budget over the six per cent limitation.

In several conversations we have had with members of the city council, they have without exception told the same story. They say the city is doing the best job it can with the funds allotted for street improvement, but the sum allotted is pitifully inadequate.

We have had to endure poor streets, an outmoded water distribution system, and inadequate fire protection because up to now the general opinion has been that it costs too much to make these improvements and if we wait long enough costs would come down.

The same opinion was held in 1940 and in prior years, but the policy has been a short-sighted one, because while we have waited for costs to come down they have actually more than doubled and the best prospects are with the present inflation tendency that costs won't decline in the near future.

We are moving in the right direction in improving our water system because if we don't we can't expect to hold even our present industries. Improvement of the water system also ties in with efforts to give more fire protection plus added mechanical equipment. We must provide this fire protection or face the prospect of seeing our insurance rates considerably increased, which would be even more costly than bringing our fire fighting equipment up to standard. This leads us to the final conclusion that it is cheaper in the long run to fix our streets than to pay even a higher amount for broken tires and for auto repairs.

Now that it's almost time to start working on the city budget, it is a good time to give some of the suggestions above a high priority.

A MILK SHORTAGE IN PROSPECT?

Since the Korean conflict began it has been suggested several times that the nation is headed for a meat shortage. We can't throw in with the meat shortage prospect, but we can see some reason for a milk shortage unless the plight of the small milk producer is lifted.

There is a controversy now raging over the milk control law and the present price of milk, but the fact remains that neither the little fellow who is milking his small herd, nor the milk processor such as we have in Cottage Grove, is getting in on the gravy, if there is any.

Milking a bunch of cows, in case you have never tried it, is an around-the-clock proposition, seven days a week from sun-up to sun-down and sometimes longer. If you expect to stay in business, you can't afford to be sick or to go to your mother-in-law's funeral. The worst part of it is the best local dairyman we know can't even approach sawmill wages after he pays his feed bill and other expenses necessary to his business.

The principal drawback to dairy farming or chicken farming is the present price of feed. Most of the feed comes from the big farms using mass production. Feed prices are pegged high by parity. The main difficulty is that with farm mechanization we are undergoing a sort of production revolution, with the squeeze being put on the little man.

It is also traditional with most House committees that the Chairman and the ranking minority member may sit as members of all sub-committees. Cannon has ruled out that ranking minority member right and has stacked several of the most important sub-committees on a five to two or a four to two basis.

This gives the Republican minority practically no voice on appropriations and will have the effect of sabotaging the efforts of those who are battling to reduce non-essential spending. When, or if, it becomes necessary to take this problem to the floor of the House, Chairman Cannon will find his dictatorial attitude vigorously opposed on both sides of the aisle.

The bill to authorize Federal construction of access roads within the National forests did not get to the floor of the House last session, but I look for fairly early action on it this year. The Forest Service objected to the bill as passed by the Senate because of what were considered to be burdensome requirements regarding holding hearings prior to constructing roads.

Industry representatives and others, however, insisted that such a road program should be made a subject of general public knowledge. I recently helped re-write that section of the bill so that it is now completely satisfactory to all concerned—including the Forest Service. With this controversy removed there should be little difficulty in securing approval for the bill because everyone, it seems to me, recognizes the necessity of getting roads into the forests so that mature and overripe timber can be utilized.

NEW DEFENSE DIRECTOR

Announcement was made Saturday by Governor Douglas McKay of the appointment of Jack A. Hayes as state director of Oregon's civil defense program.

The state legislature recently made the job a full-time position, paying \$7,200 a year. Hayes has been assistant fire marshal, loaned to the department of civil defense, under Louis A. Starr. Starr requested the governor not to consider his name in filling the new position.

The new director, who recently returned from Washington, D. C. where he consulted with C. D. department heads, immediately announced the appointment of three staff coordinators. They are Maurice Sheppard, operations; Robert Sandstrom, administration; and Thomas Brubeck, public information.

CAR TAG PLAN WORKS

Savings made for the state by staggering expiration dates for automobile licenses and the use of permanent license plates are exceeding \$1,000,000 a year according to the first annual report on the new system devised and installed last year by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

Through the use of a small date tab, the expiration of the permanent plates have been "tagged" so that approximately one-twelfth of the total number of registrations will expire each month throughout the year.

The permanent, staggered system applies only to passenger vehicles and pickups, trucks remain on the old system, with a single exception. Acceptance of the permanent plate and staggered renewal periods, by motor vehicle owners, has been almost unanimously favorable.

The new system has wiped out the long lines of waiting vehicle owners common to the old system of a year-end expiration date for all motorists. Hundreds of extra employees needed under the old system have been eliminated.

The number of motor vehicles registered in Oregon rose from 470,154 in 1946 to 798,000 in 1951. Revenues rose from \$4,717,538 in 1946 to \$11,000,000 in 1951.

CHURNING MILK LAWS

The defeat of the bill to allow the sale of colored oleo had varied and potent repercussions.

Milk producers and milk distributors are not watching the same crystal ball. Both groups are apprehensive of the other getting an advantage when the compromise bill comes up. Compromise it must be. The oleo defeat made the housewives more militant. The narrow margin of defeat encouraged them. Now the dairy strategists see their mistake. The bill to abolish milk control should have been considered first. Now they are hoping the compromise bill to grant the butter producers exclusive rights to a certain shade of yellow will appease the oleo manufacturers crowd and they will pull out of the fight to abolish milk control.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR

Bills recently passed by the legislature and signed by the governor would:

Repeal law which permits any private person to call upon the services of the county surveyor.

Authorize the national guard to lease and rent property.

Increase annual State Bar dues from \$12 to \$20 a year.

Increase the cost of the state's Blue Book from 50 cents to \$1. Change the set alcoholic content of liquor from 17 per cent by weight to 14 per cent by volume when local option elections are held to determine whether such alcoholic liquors shall be prohibited in a county or city.

Repeal law requiring state labor commissioner to make reports to each legislature on the number, social and sanitary habits, nature and employment, earnings, etc. of Japanese and Chinese.

IN THE IDEA STAGE

Proposals for acts are being studied to broaden the state game commission from five to seven or more members, consolidation of the state employment compensation commission under the Oregon labor commissioner, to require a tape recording of all evidence given committees and of statements made by members of committees in session and the use of electric voting machines in both the house and senate which operate to show only totals of votes favoring or against a motion. The votes of individual members would not be disclosed until the legislature had adjourned. Would this stop "log-rolling" vote trading and pressure plus "influence?"

SEVEN APPLICANTS FOR COUNTY JOB

Seven applications have been received for the recently vacated job of county engineer, County Judge Day T. Bayly announced at Eugene Saturday. The job may be left open until July, Judge Bayly indicated and will pay a salary of \$6,000 to \$7,000 per year. P. M. Morse, county surveyor, who resigned as county engineer in January, is carrying out the duties of engineer until his successor is appointed.
