

"Skiway" on Mt. Hood to Begin Operation Soon



"Skiway", the world's largest and longest passenger-carrying aerial tramway, will be in operation on the slopes of Oregon's majestic Mt. Hood early this year, prior to the close of the current winter sports season and well in advance of booming Pacific Northwest summer tourist trade.

This tree-top tramway opens new vistas to a portion of Oregon's magnificent Mt. Hood National Forest recreation area previously enjoyed only by ambitious hikers and skiers. Skiway provides scenic and comfortable year-round travel to the threshold of inter-

nationally famous Timberline Lodge which was constructed by the United States government in 1937 at a cost of approximately \$2,000,000.

Ten minutes travel above evergreens and crags and the Skiway "Cloudliners" come to a halt three-plus miles up Mt. Hood at the timberline landing located 100 yards west of the main entrance to the Lodge situated 6,000 feet above sea level on Oregon's highest mountain. Actual travel time required for a round trip of slightly over six miles is 20 minutes.

The aerial tramway's lower terminus rests at an elevation of 3800 feet on Oregon State Highway #50 just 55 miles east of Portland. This beautiful new Skiway Terminal building houses a completely equipped ultra modern restaurant, snack bar, gift shop, a huge guest lounge and ski shop. Furnishings throughout the terminal are of rustic mountain motif.

The massive terminal building, designed by Architect Ormand E. Bean, is built around a huge "carport" or tunnel which enables passengers to enter-exit Skiway's Cloudliner coaches from indoors via third-story loading and unloading platforms. One-way traffic to and from the coaches eliminates all congestion and confusion.

Skiway, the fabulous tree-top tramway, has required more than two years for construction. Replacement costs would reportedly exceed \$750,000.

Logging Permits Show Increase

The year 1950 saw a sharp increase in the number of logging and mill permits issued in the state, according to state forestry department officials.

A total of 12,874 permits were issued last year as compared with 10,702 for the year 1949 and 4,143 for the year 1945.

The "Forest Operation Permit" is required of all power-driven operations in western Oregon within one-eighth mile of forest land. Operations engaged in the harvesting of timber or other forest products are required to obtain a combined "Forest Operation and Conservation Harvesting Permit". Only the "Conservation Harvesting Permit" is required in eastern Oregon.

The purpose of the permits is to enforce fire control measures and protect seed sources for continuous growth of timber as required by the Oregon forest laws. The forestry department employs 32 forest inspectors to administer the law.

War Veterans Affected by Social Security Changes

World War II veterans—and the survivors of servicemen who served in World War II—are affected by the recent amendments to the Federal Social Security Act.

A social security wage credit of \$160 is generally granted for each month of active military service between September 1940 and July 1947. These wage credits will increase the amount of some old-age and survivors insurance payments. They will also make some persons eligible for survivors payments who previously did not qualify.

These new credits are not affected by Veterans Administration compensation or pension. They will not be given, however, when World War II service is credited under some other federal plan such as civil service or railroad retirement.

The \$160 wage credits for military services are particularly important to the following persons:

1. Families with children under 18 of men who died in military service where the families were previously ineligible for monthly survivors insurance.

2. Families of veterans who died after discharge where survivors insurance could not previously be paid.

3. Living World War II servicemen who have done little or no work covered by social security. Many of these now get an insured status under social security because of their service-earned wage credits.

Lane county farmers planning to enter Willamette vetch for seed certification this year will need to

have their applications on file in the office of the county agricultural agent in the Producer's Public Market Building in Eugene not later than Thursday, February 15.

County Extension Agent W. B. Parker states that a state seed certification specialist of Oregon

State College will be in Lane county soon after this date to make field inspections.

Farmers who call at the county agent's office to file applications should bring with them the blue certification tags from the bags in which they purchased their

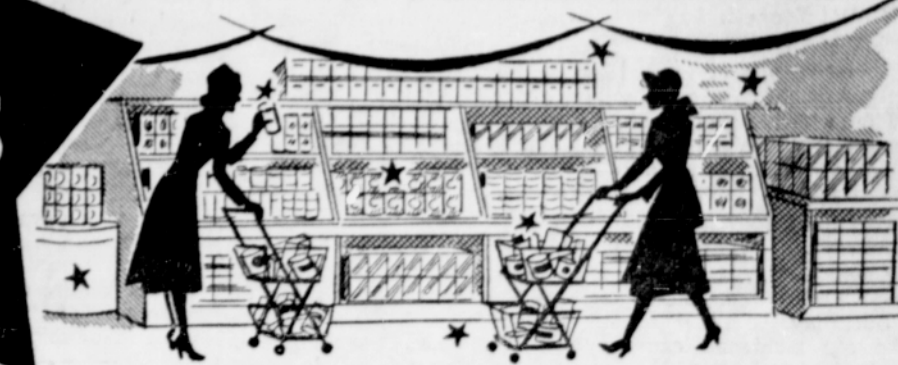
planting stock last fall and will also need to furnish a record of crops grown on the vetch land in 1948, 1949, and 1950, according to Parker.
