THE BOYS WOULD TURN DOWN THE QUICK EDUCATION

No doubt you have read the proposal to speed up our education process in the public school and college by having eleven month school terms, which would enable the average high school pupil to graduate at 16 while the college student could graduate at 19. The high school boys have not been consulted about this proposition, but we know without asking them that they would turn thumbs down on the proposal, since it would mean two months less vacation in the summer.

Presumably the proposition is pitched on the basis of aid the national emergency or the national defense, whichever term you care to use. While it would have its merits, the speed up process would also work a hardship on the teachers in that numbers of public school teachers feel that they have to spend some time in training and learning new teaching methods, which only the summer school offers if they continue to teach without interruption. Also other teachers take advantage of the vacation period to study for degrees or college graduation.

Not many years back educators felt that it was helpful to both the student and to our economy in keeping the boy or girl in school as long as possible. A later graduation meant the student was more mature and he or she was also held from the labor market that much longer. At least this was the reasoning of the 1940 period.

A national emergency always furnishes a fertile field for socialistic legislation. It gives to bureaucrats undreamed of powers to control the lives, the well-being and the future of all the people. Total bureaucracy or regimentation is the ultimate goal many of these bureaucrats would like to inflict upon us. They are making great strides right now towards the goal. If they are allowed to have their way, we are apt to wake up one fine day and suddenly realize that while we were fighting dictatorship thousands of miles away, we got one in our own country through the back door.
