## Festival of Roses to Be Held In Portland This Week End

PORTLAND—The City of Roses climaxes its gala centennial-year celebration with an action packed "Do You Remember" theme Rose Festival program, June 6-10.

The 43rd annual festival program gets under way Wednesday night, June 6, with the coronation of Queen Gloria I (Gloria Krieger of Portland's Jefferson high school). High school students will pay musical tribute to their queen through their fifteen-hundred voice, all-city chorus, 250-piece brass band, and an all-city orchestra to accompany outstanding vocal soloists.

The 63rd annual Rose Show, sponsored by the Portland Rose Society, oldest and largest organization of its kind in the world, opens at 1 o'clock Thursday, June 7, following colorful "knighting" ceremonies staged by white-suited Royal Rosarians on the Masonic Temple steps.

Twenty of the world's top ski jumpers will compete in the Rose Festival's "International Champion Ski Jumps" to be staged on Thursday and Friday nights, June 7 and 8, on the largest man-made structure ever built for night ski jumping. This massive ski jump tower, now completed within Multnomah stadium, soars fourteen stories skyward and will be completely covered with artificial snow.

"Hopalong Cassidy" and his famous horse, Topper, will lead the world-famous Rose Festival "Grand Floral Parade" when the procession moves along the five mile parade route on Friday morning, June 8, at 10 a.m. The "Do You Remember" theme of the 1951 Rose Festival will be depicted by fifty all-florally decorated floats interspersed with a like number of bands and marching units.

On Saturday morning ten thousand youngsters take over the festivities when they stage their Junior Rose Festival parade through northeast Portland's Hollywood district.

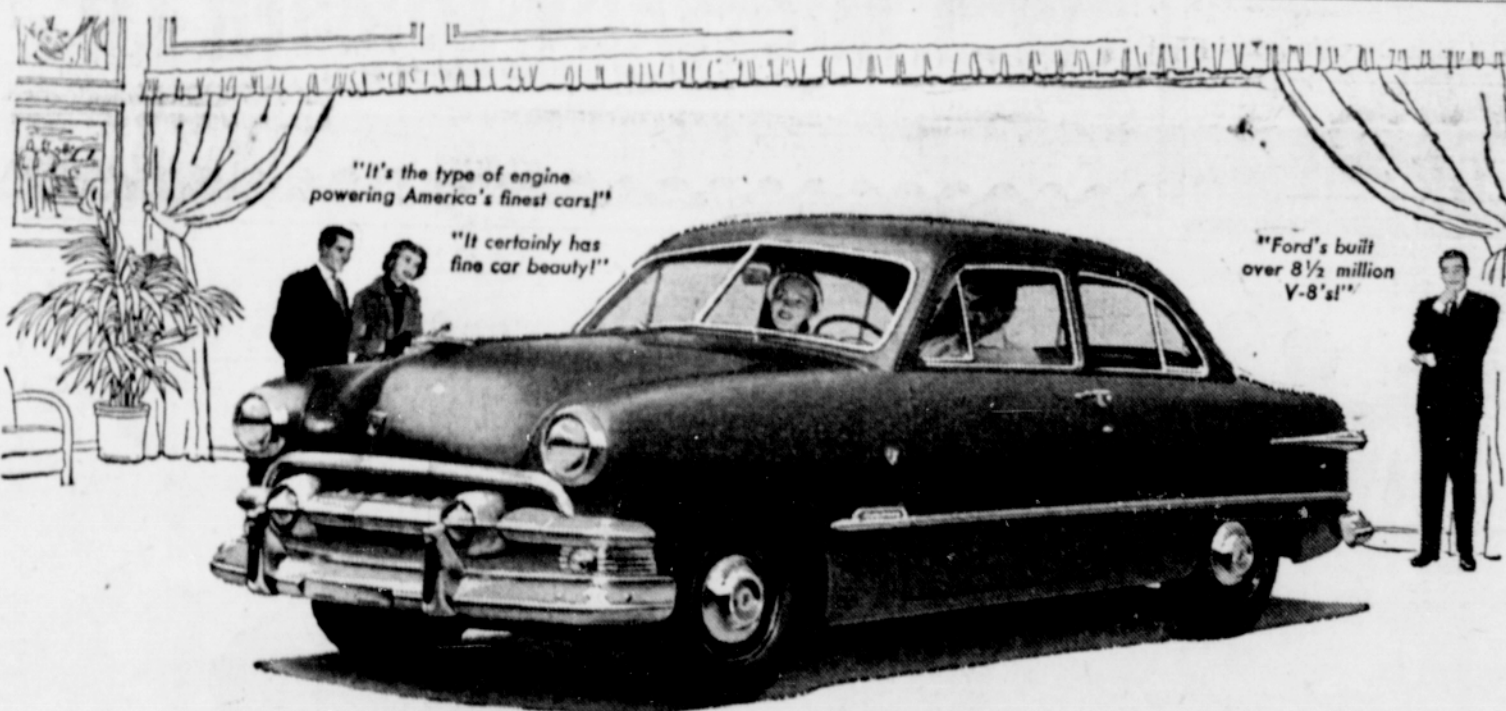

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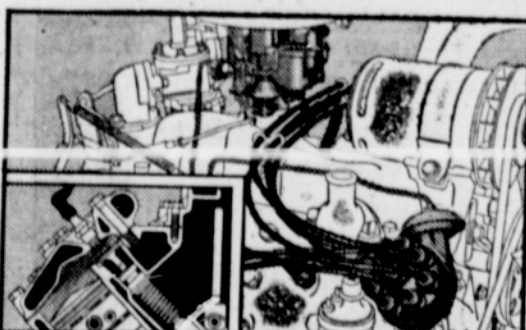
