The appearance is being sponsored by the Cottage Grove Catholic Daughters and Knights of Columbus.

friars Guild in New York City. The play has been received with such enthusiasm that the Abbey players were induced to go on a national tour this summer which is taking them to 17 states. The troop is playing this week in Minnesota.

Immediately prior to the appearance in Cottage Grove on July 1, the company will present the stage hit in the Memorial auditorium in Sacramento, California, on Friday, June 29. The players will come to Cottage Grove direct from Sacramento. Their appearance here will be their only one in Oregon.

Tickets for the drama will go on sale next week.

Blasting Clears Siuslaw Log Jams

With the aid of blasting powder and caterpillar tractor, a game commission crew has completed the clean-up of log jams blocking fish migration in Siuslaw river tributaries.

Streams cleared this year include Nelson, Thompson, Misery, Indian, North Fork Misery, Deadwood, McLeod, and Porter creeks. Several of these streams were worked on last year but winter freshets formed new barriers.

Walter Tyckman, game commission agent who just completed a survey of streams in the Siuslaw basin, reports that for the present all jams blocking fish migration are removed. The task is a continuous one, though, as new log jams are formed each year.

MARTIN BROS. BOX FACTORY AT OAKLAND RESUMES WORK JUNE 11

The dispute between the Martin Brothers Box Co. at Oakland and the union, which idled some 550 workers, was settled June 6 at Portland. Terms of the settlement were not announced, but some of the workers were on the job Monday. The Martin plant had been idle about two months. The strike grew out of disputes over union security, length of contract and hours of work. Wages were not involved, it was said.

During the strike the company filed a \$314,000 damage suit against the union and the union filed an unfair labor charge. Neither of the suits were mentioned in the settlement.

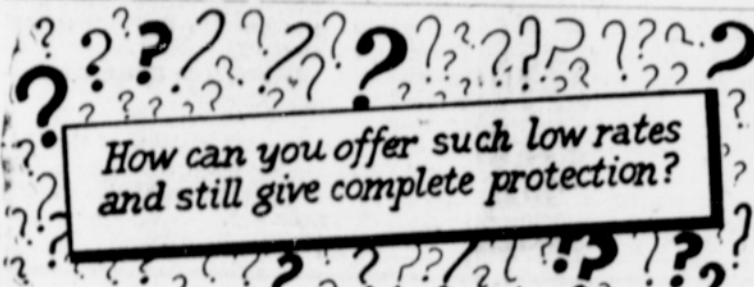
