Series of Accidents Strikes At Local Workers This Week

A series of injuries hit Cottage Grove and surrounding areas with a bang during the past few days. Six accident cases have been reported, five of them undergoing treatment in the city hospital.

A logging accident at Cougar Bend Monday evening at 7 resulted in the injury of Cliff Williams.

Williams' leg was crushed when he attempted to get clear of a falling tree and got in the way of the caterpillar.

Doctors amputated his leg at Cottage Grove Hospital Monday night. Williams' doctor reported his condition as good.

Edward Carpenter, an employee of the Brown Lumber Company, was injured Tuesday, when he was hit on the head by a falling timber.

Carpenter is in Cottage Grove Hospital. His condition is reported as fairly good.

An employee of the Forrest Veneer Company, at Curtin, is in Cottage Grove Hospital after being injured at work, Tuesday.

The man, Robert Oatney, suffered a sprained spine, and was brought to the hospital by ambulance. His condition is good.

A falling snag hit William F. Berg of Drain, Tuesday, while he was at work. He has an injured right hip. He is in the hospital suffering from shock.

Berg is employed by the Douglas Timber Corporation.

Jack Monteth is in a Eugene hospital with injuries which he suffered Wednesday morning at the Beach Logging Company operations.

Total extent of his injuries was not known Wednesday afternoon.

Tom Parker, Disston, known as the mayor of Lund Park, is recovering in Cottage Grove Hospital from an injury received when a rock fell from the Bohemia rock crusher and struck him.

Parker, who is in his eighties, had his left arm cut off below the elbow. His doctor reports his condition as fairly good.

Lt. Harold Mackin Returns From Tour In Korean Waters

Norfolk, Va.—Lieutenant Harold A. Mackin, USN, Staff Secretary and Communications Officer for Destroyer Squadron 16, has returned to the United States aboard the flagship USS English after a tour of duty in the Korean war zone. Upon returning, he was given a leave of absence to join his wife, Virginia, and three children, Harold, Jr., Bruce and Marilyn, at 6115 S.E. 34th Street, Portland.

Lt. Mackin, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Mackin of Cottage Grove, was active in the Naval Reserves in Portland prior to his recall to active duty in January 1951. He was manager of the Appliance and Radio department of Lipman, Wolfe and Co., Portland, at the time of his recall.

During World War II he served 39 months aboard destroyers in the Pacific area, and in this war, has participated in the bombardment of enemy supply lines from south of the 38th parallel to north of the Korean port of Chongjin, often operating in heavily mined waters. His squadron played an important part in the siege of Wonsan.

More recently he was serving on the staff of the Screen Commander while operating with the fast carriers of the famous Task Force 77 off both Korean coasts.

Lt. Mackin, holder of the Asiatic-Pacific Theater ribbon with four stars, American Theater and World War II Victory Medal, has been awarded the Korean Service ribbon with one star, Navy Occupation Medal with Asia clasp and China Service Medal for exemplary service during the past months.

7 Timber Tracts Sold Last Week

Seven tracts of Oregon and California Revested Lands timber totaling 20,210,000 board feet of mixed species and 5650 lineal feet of red cedar poles were sold by the District Bureau of Land Management last week for \$521,311 at Eugene.

The timber, on 460 acres, was appraised at \$489,540. Competing bids were received on four of the tracts; three sold at appraised prices. Most of the timber was Douglas Fir.

Lester C. Dunn, assistant district forester, conducted the sales, which recorded a high bid of \$35,65 per thousand feet for Douglas Fir on one tract after 20 minutes of spirited competition in which 34 bids were made by three firms.

Successful bidders included these firms: Fred A. Hills, Springfield, who paid \$103,524 for 3,495,000 board feet; C. W. Guerrier Lumber Co., Springfield \$104,539.25 for 4,245,000 board feet on two tracts; Madonna and Arnold Lumber Co., Cottage Grove, \$57,616.50 for 2,005,000 board feet.

Globe Lumber Co., Eugene, \$50,697.50 for 1,675,000 board feet; James Palanuk, Eugene, \$26,630.75 for 770,000 board feet; and Long-Bell Lumber Co., Eugene, \$178,803 for 8,020,000 board feet.

Coiner said that the main sewage lines should be connected with the trunk line within the next week, except for the west side which is separate from the rest of the city.

Corvallis engineers are working on plans for the new sewage disposal plant. The plans are scheduled to be completed in about two months. Delay of materials may set back the building of the plant, however, it should be completed in 1952.

Navy Plans to Call More Reservists

Three thousand enlisted naval reserve petty officers will be ordered into active military service during the month of September, 1951. They will be drawn from the fleet reserve, organized reserve, and volunteer reserve.

This quota will cover the first quarter of the fiscal year 1952. It is in accordance with previously announced requirements of the navy for an average of 1,000 trained naval reservists per month during the forthcoming fiscal year.

The quota will include the following: chief, first class, second and third class petty officers in the rates of fire control technician, fire controlman, personnel man, ship's serviceman, interior communications electrician and dental technician.

Chief, first class and second class petty officers in the rates of quartermaster, radarman, sonarman and electrician's mate.

First class, second class and third class petty officers in the rate of boilerman.

First class and second class petty officers in the rate of gunner's mate, machinist's mate, pipe fitter and damage controlman.

Inactive reservists will not be called to active service except when they possess critical skills not available in the organized reserve.
