This project has been under consideration for some time by the Lions club, in fact some funds have already been raised toward the lighting of the field. Of course this group could not finance such a large project and in order to make use of funds already on hand the community as a whole will have to back the affair. The group favored doing it through taxation and according to valuation of this community no taxpayer would be injured in any way. A special election would have to be called to decide the matter.

Other adjacent communities will also be invited to participate in the program which could be started now and progress through several years as is being done in towns all around Creswell.

A recreational board would be established by a vote of the people and operated similar to those of the schools or rural fire districts. Baseball, softball, football, track meets and swimming were all taken under consideration. The consensus of opinion was that a definite program would help hold our high school at Creswell instead of becoming involved in more consolidation problems. C. C. Mrs. Margaret Thornton has purchased the Grace Clark residence property on north Fifth street and has moved in.

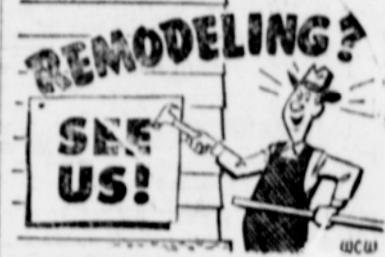
