The heat of strong sunshine may permanently set and darken stains containing tannin, such as those of cherries, peaches, pears, plums, soft drinks or mustard. Such stains should be first sponged with cold water as soon as they are made. If any stain remains after this treatment, rub glycerine or soapless shampoo into the stain, then sponge with cool water. Sometimes it helps to apply a few drops of vinegar to the stain after the glycerine or shampoo treatment, rinsing thoroughly afterward with cool water. Never use soap or heat until the stain has disappeared.

**Barbecued Hamburgers**  
Ingredients: 1 lb. ground beef, 1/2 cup rolled oats, 2 cups Pot Milk, 3 tablespoons finely cut onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 3 tablespoons shortening, 1/2 cup bottled barbecue sauce or catsup, 8 round sandwich buns.  
Mix well meat, oats, milk, onion, salt and pepper. Shape in 8 flat patties. Brown slowly on both sides in hot shortening. Spread meat with equal parts of barbecue sauce. Cover and cook 5 min. Serve in toasted buns.
